**A MEETING THAT WAS A MEETING**

Muckle din and muckle woo' As the devil said when he clicked the so',

The dear old Patriot was in hysterics, all last week, over certain meetings held by Sir Louis Davies in Belfast and Murray Harbor. The first of these gatherings took place at Pownal and thither our contemporary's reporter repaired, with his bump of admiration in excellent working order, with greatly elongated aural appendages, and wearing a tremendous pair of goggles. With the aid of this equipment, Jack Falstaff's performances in describing the men in buckram suit and kental green is made to sink into insignificance compared with The Patriot's description of the audience which responded to Sir Louis Davies' invitation to meet him at Pownal.

To begin with the village itself. It behaved well. It was "picturesque" that evening. Then, there was a "splendid meeting". The large hall was crowded to the door. "Several ladies added beauty and color to the audience." (The allusion to the color of the ladies is, we assure our readers, The Patriot's.) "When Sir Louis entered, the hall shook with the 'tremendous ovation.'" He "stepped to the front amid a perfect hurricane of applause." He "electrified the splendid gathering." "The enthusiastic cheering and applause made Pownal Hall re-echo from time to time." He concluded "amidst vociferous cheering and applause." The "tiger," which followed, "rang out on the frosty air awakening the peaceful slopes" of Pownal.

By actual count, there were just ninety seven persons at the meeting, a fair proportion of whom were friends of the Opposition candidate, Mr. McLean.

But while Pownal appropriately donned its "kirtal sheen" to receive Sir Knight, while men and ladies repaired to that political trysting place not to speak to each other in wooing tones, but to roar, according to The Patriot, like bulls of Bashan, there were a few seraphic persons present, whose admiration for themselves and each other was only surpassed by the veneration of the man of the goggles.

One of these persons is our brand new Attorney General. Sir Louis said he was "young, able and talented;" and the reporter says these are also his sentiments. "He," (Mr. D. A. McKinnon) entered at once "into a thoroughly clear and comprehensive discussion." "The fixed attention" "the emphatic shake of the head" and "the bursts of applause" showed that "he made a pronounced impression" on the "big meeting"—of ninety-seven. "His name is a synonym for all that is true, noble and just in the Belfast district," said Sir Louis; and the reporter at once marked it down in his book. It was especially delightful to find the veracious reporter declare Mr. Irving "consistent in temperance" notwithstanding his support of Mr. Fraquharson and his "blood money" License Act.

But the Graces go in threes. Therefore it was more fitting that the political cherubim or seraphim at Pownal should number three. The reporter, having found no trouble, with the aid of his goggles, in locating the two lesser seraphs, surely our readers need not be told that a searchlight was necessary to distinguish the third. By no means. There he stood "looking in perfect health and the happiest spirits," "bowing and smiling to the ninety-seven," "the ablest all round statesman in the Dominion Government," "Prince Edward Island's brilliant Knight," "a Rupert in debate," "the Island's first orator."

It would have been interesting if the reporter had explained how much of the "bowing and smiling," and "happy spirits" were due to the receipt from the people for \$22.92 per day, Sundays included, besides travelling expenses for the time he was spending in canvassing for Irving and McKinnon. But why demand unreasonable things. The reporter, with all his accomplishments, is not a mind reader. Therefore the question is ruled out, as irrelevant if not impertinent.

Island very freely, and freights are scarce. Nova Scotia potatoes collect 32c. Pork is lower, large supplies having come from P. E. Island. There is no material change in other meat products. Eggs have advanced to 16c and 17c. Oats have eased off a little in value, P. E. Island stock ruling at about 35c to 37c. Hay and feed are unchanged as compared with last report.
