Worldwide Harnessing Of Rivers Is Recommended

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) An international panel of seven experts recommended Wednesday night that a special office be set up here to promote worldwide harnessing of rivers for power, irrigation, navigation, flood control and water supply. Their 60-page report on integrated river basin development said more than three-quarters of the earth's land surface is susceptible of such development. They suggest that several hundred billions of dollars could and would go into such work in the next 40 to 50 years.

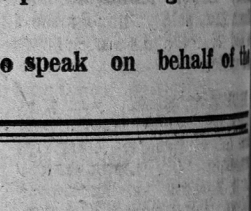
