NOT THIS SEASON.—The St. John Telegraph intimates that the project of putting the steamer City of Monticello on the route between Chatham and P. E. Island, has been given up, at least for this season.

AN UNUSUAL SEASON.—A flurry of snow in New York city on the first of June was hardly needed to convince the inhabitants that this is an unusual season. Snow was also reported in Northern Wisconsin and Minnesota, while on the night of May 31st the country north of Pennsylvania seems to have been visited by a frost that in some places hardened the ground, and almost everywhere did damage to the early crops.

DEATH OF AN ISLANDER.—The Amherst correspondent of the St. John Sun writes: Allan Hunter of Dundas, P. E. I., came to Amherst on business about ten days ago and put up at the Cumberland house. He was taken ill about a week ago, and on medical attendance being summoned he was found to be suffering from an acute attack of Bright's disease, from which he died yesterday. His body was sent to P. E. I. for interment.

A GOOD MOVE.—We learn that Mr. J. B. Russ, the genial proprietor of "The Russ," has rented the McMillan property and will fit it up as an extension of his present hotel since it lies immediately across the street. The beautiful grounds will be used for various games. We have no doubt Mr. Russ' enterprise will prove remunerative as no more beautiful grounds could be chosen for such a purpose.—Summerside Farmer.

CITY SCHOOL BOARD.—The regular monthly meeting of the school board took place yesterday evening. The teachers reports showed the enrollment to be 144, average attendance 1207, percentage of 88.6. On motion the Board adapted the principals' suggestion that the closing exercises in the halls be dispensed with. The schools will close for the midsummer holidays as follows: West, Kent, Monday, 28th inst.; Queen Square, Tuesday, 29th inst.; Prince Street, Wednesday, 30th inst. They will re-open on Wednesday, 1st of September.

HILLSBOROUGH PARK.—This beautiful spot of city property has during the past few weeks, been well attended to by our city government. Some 50 or 60 fine young trees have been planted on the park. The pathways through it have been cleaned up and covered with coal cinders. The mound in the centre of the square is guarded by very nice turned posts and woven wire fence. The boxes protecting the trees are being whitewashed as is also the old fence itself. Mr. Dalziel and Councillor McCarron, under whose supervision these improvements have been made, deserves great credit for the praiseworthy ornamentation of Hillsborough Park.
