

Candidate Resigns Seat

Liberal candidate for Prince County in the federal election George MacKay, Albany, said yesterday that he will "sign the papers today" resigning his seat in the provincial Legislature.

Provincially, Mr. MacKay represents the 4th Prince district. Mr. MacKay said he will send his resignation to John R. MacLean, Speaker of the Legislative Assembly.

According to the Canada Elections Act, a provincial member, running in a federal election, must resign his seat by official nomination day which is June 4.

S'side Town Councilor Llewellyn Rogers Dies

Summerside Town Councilor, Llewellyn Rogers, 69, died suddenly in his sleep Thursday night due to a heart condition with which he had been afflicted for the past year.

Councilor Rogers retired last year as manager of the Maritime Central Airways flight office at Summerside, having been employed with this company for 20 years. He was the second person to be employed by the Canadian National Railways as ticket agent at Summerside.

Previously he had been with the late Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Rogers, his father was a former mayor of Summerside, and was one of the founders and partners in the firm of Rogers and Arnett in Summerside. His mother was a direct descendant of the Green family who were of the original settlers at "Green's Shore," which is now the town of Summerside. The late Coun. Rogers spent his entire lifetime as a resident of Summerside.

As a young man he attended St. Dunstan's College before becoming actively engaged in the business of fish farming.

A keen sportsman, he was a renowned hockey player for many years as a member of the Summerside Crystal hockey team in its most successful seasons of hockey.

In his more recent years the cultivation and growing of fish were among one of his greatest interests, and the products of his flower garden have been consistent winners at the annual provincial flower show.

Coun. Rogers had served as a member of the Summerside Town Council for the past four years, and attended and took an active part in the regular meet-

ing Tuesday evening this week. He had been active as usual Thursday and up to the time of retirement for the night.

In addition to his wife, the former Audrey Rogers of Summerside, he is survived by the following sons and daughters: Arthur, Middleton, N.S.; Ferno (Brod), Summerside; Claudia, Montreal; Ralph, Sussex, England; Ruth, Mrs. F. McAnson, Moncton; Gordon, Summerside; Marion, Summerside; Dr. Lea, Big Rapids, Michigan; and Mrs. Nan Cunningham, Summerside.

Resting at the Bowness Funeral Home, until Monday afternoon, the funeral will be held from the Summerside United Church at 2:30 p.m.

Bedoune Men Elect Slate

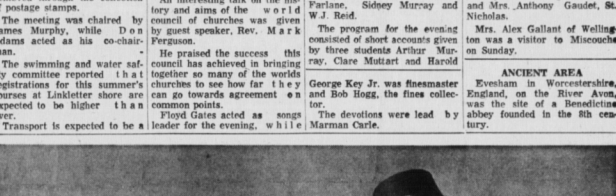
BEDOUQUE — The men's association of the Bedoune United Church held its May super meeting in the church hall recently with about 30 present. The president, Sidney Murray, presided.
