"MAGISTRATE'S COURT AT GEORGETOWN—Stipendiary Magistrate for King's County, Joseph W. MacDonald, Q.C., held court in Georgetown on Monday, May 26th at 2:00 p.m. Three cases were on the docket. In the first case a resident of Georgetown pleaded guilty to a charge of driving an automobile while his ability was impaired by the use of alcohol. He was fined \$50.00 and costs or in default to serve one month in jail. His operating license was cancelled for three months. In the second case a Georgetown resident pleaded guilty to a charge of being intoxicated in a public place and was fined \$50.00 and costs or one month in jail, this being a second offence under this section of the Act. The case of a resident of Souris, charged under section 285-4A of the Criminal Code, which had been adjourned from a previous hearing, was next on the docket. Store And Warehouse Destroyed By Fire At Peter's Road Yesterday

Fire yesterday afternoon at Peter's Road destroyed a two-storey store and attached warehouse owned by Mr. Guy Reid. Loss was estimated at approximately \$10,000, partially covered by insurance. The buildings were estimated at \$4,000 and the stock at \$6,000.

The attic of the building was in flames when the fire was discovered by Mr. Reid about 2 p.m. The outbreak was believed caused

by a defective flue. The blaze spread quickly and the efforts of a large number of neighbors failed to save either the building or stock. However, rain helped the fire fighters prevent the flames from spreading. The store was originally built by Mr. Archie Johnston and was operated for years by Mr. J. L. MacKinnon, now of Murray River. The latter sold out to Mr. Reid in 1946.

Last night Mr. Reid said he was still undecided whether to rebuild.—C.
