Grand Division Meeting.

THE session of Grand Division, held yesterday, was very largely attended. Fifteen new members were initiated. The reports of officers showed the Order to be in a very flourishing condition at the present time. The Scott Act came in for a good share of attention, and the representatives generally, instead of feeling discouraged, expressed themselves as anxious and determined to enforce the Act, if confirmed by the Privy Council.

A clearance card was granted to T. T. Fairburn, Esq., late of Banner Division. During the afternoon Mr. C. Lewis, of this city, took a very good photograph of the Grand Division in Regalia.

The public meeting, in the evening, was crammed. The Chairman, Rev. Dr. Murray, opened the meeting with an excellent address, and called upon the 82nd Batt. Brass Band to discourse sweet music. The address of welcome was delivered by the Rev. D. G. McDonald, on behalf of the City Divisions, and replied to in suitable terms by G. W. Patriarch G. W. Bentley, Esq. The Rev. Dr. Fitzgerald gave a temperance address, having the right ring about it. A temperance recitation—"Fruits of the Wine Glass"—was rendered in a very touching and beautiful manner by Miss Holman, of Hold Fast Division.

The following resolution was moved by Rev. J. C. Berrie, of Montague, seconded by Wm. Sanderson, Esq., of Georgetown, supported by Mr. G. W. Millner, and carried unanimously:

Resolved, That whereas difficulties of a legal character appear to have arisen, which, though for a time, may militate against, and partially paralyze our immediate temperance action; yet, nevertheless, this meeting deems it the duty of every temperance advocate, and also pledges itself faithfully to adhere to, and as far as practicable to press unflinchingly towards the sustentation and support of the Scott Act.

The meeting was one of the very best ever held in the Y. M. C. A. Hall, and the beautiful and stirring strains of Galbraith's Band added no small part to the success of the meeting. The Delegates returned home to-day.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Telegraph Amalgamation Bill.

Canadian Pacific Railway

An Able Speech by Sir Charles.

GENERAL NEWS.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

OTTAWA, April 18.

The Debate on the Telegraph Amalgamation Bill took place last night. Although it was not a Government measure, the ministers voted for it, but all the Island members voted against it.

Mr. Brecken in a stirring speech denounced Telegraph Combinations.

The amendment to reduce telegraph rates was lost. Mr. Blake voted in favor of the high rates. The Island members—Messrs. Brecken, McDonald, Hackett and Muttart—supported the amendment.

To-day Sir Charles Tupper delivered an able and exhaustive speech on the Pacific Railway Policy. He showed the Government had successfully grappled with this great question, and had given increased employment to thousands of working men; had induced capitalists to invest money in Canada; besides it had caused a tide of immigration to flow into the country which was unprecedented in the history of any new Dominion.

Mr. Blake followed Sir Charles Tupper in a long, laborious speech. Mr. Bunster was next, and Mr. McKenzie adjourned the debate.

HALIFAX, April 18.

The remains of the late Archbishop Hannan were lying in state in the drawing room of the Glebe House to-day, and were visited by hundreds of persons. The body is arrayed in full pontificals, and is lying on a white platform, the edges of which are festooned with lace flowers. At the head of the bier is a beautiful large cherub covered with white blossoms. Large wax candles stand at each corner, in black covered sconces. At the foot of the bier is a little raised platform, covered with white, on which rests a handsome floral crown, a Bible and two handsome candelabra, in which are burning wax candles. Fastened up with a white band against the book case, opposite the bier, is an archiepiscopal crozier. In one corner of the room is the coffin, a very handsome one, covered with purple velvet, and beautifully mounted with silver.

LONDON, April 18.

At the Mansion House Police Court to-day, the charges against the Marquis of Huntley, of obtaining £50,000 from the Standard Bank, under false pretences, were withdrawn.

In the Commons to-day, Wm. M. Johnson, Attorney General, for Ireland, said that whenever Parnell presents himself at Kilmainham, he will be legally detained under the old warrant.

All of Lorillard's horses have been scratched for the Epsom spring meeting engagements. To-day thirty-five persons were killed by a colliery explosion and seventy were badly burned.

The disabled sealing steamer "Merelin" has not yet arrived.
