## Red Cross Team In Summerside

With the arrival of the twelve member mobile Red Cross blood donor team from Halifax at Summerside last evening, the three white vehicles—emblazoned on each side with the Red Cross emblem—which carry the team members and all the equipment for use at the clinics, will serve as reminders to residents in Prince County of the urgent need for 1260 donors at the five centres in which clinics will be held this week.

This is the second of the five visits the mobile Red Cross team makes to Prince Edward Island each year—the first one was early in April when three days of clinics were held in Charlottetown with a total attendance of 1405 donors on the 1185 objective.

A quota of at least 660 has been set for the clinics being held today and tomorrow for the residents of Summerside and the surrounding area at the Legion Home. Today's times are from 2-4 and 7-9, and tomorrow morning there will be a special clinic between 9 and 10, along with the usual 2-4 and 7-9 hours. The morning hour should prove to be a convenient time for those who may not be able to attend in the afternoon or evening.

## Yancey Has Lesson And Then Cops Title

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP)—Record-setting Bert Yancey, 27, the man who took lessons from his wife a week ago, won the \$100,000 Memphis open golf tournament Sunday and collected the biggest payoff of his seven-year pro career.

His 72-hole total of 265-15 under par—broke the Memphis Open record of 266 set by Cary Middlecoff in 1961 and is the PGA low for the year.

Yancey's victory was worth \$20,000 and made him the third multiple winner of 1966. The others are Doug Sanders, with three victories and Arnold Palmer, with two. Neither played here.

**GETS FIVE BIRDIES**  
Yancey, a former West Point cadet playing out of Philadelphia, birdied five holes to post a final round 33-33-66. He started the day at 11-under par 199, one stroke behind Gene Littler.

Littler came in second with a 10-under-par 270. He won \$12,000. Johnny Pott was third at 271 and won \$7,500.

Littler ran into trouble early Sunday and was three over par after two holes. At the turn, he had fallen four strokes behind Yancey.

experiment from the spacecraft and mounted a movie camera and a mirror.

He found things a bit difficult at first—his heel got snagged while standing in the seat; he had a tendency to float upward while on the 25-foot lifeline and the line kept getting in his way.

**GUIDED BY LIFELINE**  
One of his main jobs was to see how well he could get around with only a lifeline to guide him. Later, he was to glide up to 140 feet from the spacecraft, an exercise cancelled because it was to have been done with the super-jet jet.

"I've got snake all over me," Cernan said at one point. The black snake is the nickname the astronauts have given the umbilical cord, designed to feed him oxygen and provide communications lines.

The stroll was the highlight of the frequently troubled flight. The astronauts earlier accomplished three rendezvous exercises with a stubby, wierd-looking target satellite.

While Cernan strolled the skies, the satellite they had pulled away from Saturday ambled along 145 miles behind the spacecraft, still looking like an "angry alligator" with its protective shroud on one end. The shroud prevented Gemini 9 from docking with it.

**PREPARE FOUR HOURS.**  
Both pilots spent nearly four hours preparing for Cernan's cosmic feat.

For a few minutes, they thought they had serious trouble. Gemini 9 appeared to be in the same wild-thruster problem that caused an emergency end of the previous Gemini flight.

Stafford noticed the spacecraft rolling faster and faster until he pinned the trouble on one of the small manoeuvring jets. He immediately switched it off.

**PRAYS FOR ASTRONAUTS**  
VATICAN CITY (AP)—Pope Paul prayed Sunday for the U.S. Gemini 9 astronauts and praised them as "pioneers of celestial space." He included them in his Sunday midday blessing and address from the window of his apartment above St. Peter's Square.

## Viet Nam Bickering Continues

SAIGON (AP)—South Viet Nam's government worked against the clock Sunday to add 10 civilians to the ruling 10-man military dictatorship amid signs that militant Buddhists will reject the slate.

The enlarged directorate is supposed to be presented to the nation today.

**BICKERING PERSISTS**  
While bickering persisted, Viet Cong ambushers killed a truck-borne detail of six U.S. Air Force members on a road about 15 miles from North Viet Nam's frontier. This is in the 1st Corps area, spawning ground of the spring uprising against the government which has diverted battalions of Vietnamese troops from field duty.

In other developments U.S. Marine patrols in the Da Nang area and U.S. 25th infantry division troops involved in a new sweep 30 miles northwest of Saigon reported they have killed 38 guerrillas and captured 29. Monsoon rains limited U.S. air offensive against North Viet Nam Saturday to 38 missions.

72 candidates. The remaining candidates represented a variety of other parties ranging from Communist to Conservative.

When the election was called April 18, the standing in the 95-seat legislative assembly was Liberals 63, Union Nationale 28, Independent 1 and vacant 3.

A new Redistribution Act has brought the number of seats to 106 for this election.

Leaders vote early  
Premier Jean Lesage cast his ballot early in his Quebec City riding of Louis-Hebert and then played golf.

Daniel Johnson, leader of the Union Nationale, also was out early to vote in his riding of Bagot. He cast his ballot in his home town of St. Pie, 40 miles east of Montreal. Mr. Johnson was accompanied by his wife and his two sons, Daniel, 21, and Marc, 18.

The arrest in Montreal made shortly after the polls opened, involved a man alleged to have been driving a car carrying liquor.

In another Montreal incident, one man was detained for questioning after an official in a polling station complained of having been threatened.

Premier Lesage, 53, who first led his party to victory in 1960, was the leading Liberal campaigner.

He defended his government as one "that has not grown old" and mixed special appeals to the younger voters with a generally "pragmatic" program for Quebec's future.

**AVOID INVECTIVE**  
The premier, except for occasional eruptions, has stuck to a statistical approach, avoiding invective.

Mr. Johnson, 51, who has led the Union Nationale since 1960, also has spurned violent outbursts.

The Liberals said they aim to give Quebec more powers within Confederation as part of a general program of boosting the industrial, educational and welfare position of the province.

The union Nationale placed more campaign emphasis on Quebec autonomy, and called for tax and medical services that would not harass the "middle man."

## U.S. Miler Comes Close To Mile Mark

LOS ANGELES (CP - AP)—Jim Ryan, a Kansas University freshman, ran the mile in 3:33.7 Saturday night—one-tenth of a second off the world record, held by Michel Jazy of France.

Ryan, 19, defeated Jim Grelle of Portland, Ore., at the Compton Invitational track meet, with another American, Neil Duggan of Santa Maria, Calif., third, and Dave Bailey, 21, a pharmacy student at University of Toronto, fourth.

Grelle, who had bettered four minutes 19 times, made it 20 with his 3:56.0 clocking, but that wasn't close to Ryan, who beat the American record of 3:54.9, set by Peter Snell of New Zealand at Modesto, Calif., May 25, 1963.

Duggan was timed in 3:59.1 and Bailey in 4:01.5. No Canadian has yet run the mile in less than four minutes.

Jim Perry of Oklahoma State won the invitational 800, with Bill Crothers of Markham, Ont., second. Perry's time was 1:48.1 and Crothers finished in 1:48.2.

PARIS (AP)—Tony Roche of Australia, playing on an injured ankle shot full of pain-killing drug, scored a triumph and an off-form Nancy Richey of Dallas, Tex., was upset Sunday in the singles finals of the French international tennis championships.

The 21-year-old Roche won the men's title by defeating Ivan Gulyas, 34-year-old Hungarian ace, 6-1, 6-4, 7-5.

Ann Haydon-Jones, the British veteran, ran up a 6-3, 6-1 rout of Miss Richey.

It was a day for left-handers, since both champions are south-paws.

Roche sprained his left ankle Friday and was forced to pull out of the doubles match against Americans Clark Graebner and Dennis Ralston.

Graebner and Ralston won the men's doubles Saturday by beating Ion Tiriac and Elie Nestase of Rumania in the final, 6-3, 6-3, 6-0.

Margaret Smith and Judy Tegart won the all-Australian women's doubles final Saturday from Jill Blackman and Faye Toole, 4-6, 6-1, 6-1. It was the third straight year Miss Smith has shared the title. She won in the two previous years with Lesley Turner.



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
