New Labels Planned For Fish Products Next Year

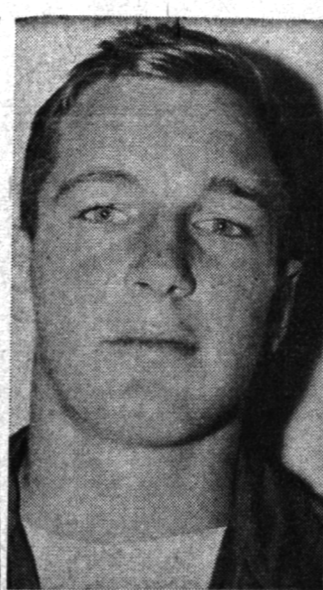
OTTAWA (CP) — The labels "Canada Inspected" and "Processed under Government Supervision" inside the outline of a maple leaf—will begin appearing on wrappers and containers of fish products on grocery shelves early next year. It will be the first time that such labels have been employed in this country. Announcement of the federal government's expanded inspection service for fresh and frozen fish products and of fish-processing plants was made Monday by Fisheries Minister MacLean in an address to the Fisheries Council of Canada. The labels will be authorized for use when a plant and its products meet a series of requirements laid down by the fisheries department. It will be a voluntary inspection service with the government paying the costs. There is a similar government service in the United States, but processors pay for it.

Personal Savings Show Upward Trend, Report

OTTAWA (CP) — Personal savings of Canadians rose sharply in the second quarter of this year as they kept the rate of their expenditures stable while incomes rose. Canadians were saving at an annual rate of \$2,500,000,000 in the April-June period, compared with \$1,700,000,000 in January-March, the bureau of statistics reported Monday. This was one of the main factors in a bureau report on the country's gross national production—total value of goods and services produced. Gross production in the second quarter totalled \$7,867,000,000, or an annual rate of \$32,246,000,000. Combined with a production of \$7,142,000,000 in the first quarter, the gross national product was hitting an annual rate of \$32,000,000,000 during the first half of the year. This rate compared with \$31,300,000,000 in the first half of 1957. HIGHER PRICES: But the gain of two per cent was based largely on higher prices and on the assumption that 1958 crop production will be about the same as last year. The actual volume of produc-

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Moncton Board Plan Stand On Air Competition

MONCTON (CP)—The Moncton board of trade announced Monday it plans to point up possible adverse effects of domestic airline competition when the Air Transport Board its here next month. The board made the announcement following meetings of the Maritime regional committee of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce and the executive council of the Maritime Provinces Boards of Trade. The Air Transport Board is scheduled to sit here Oct. 15. The committee suggested a change in the chamber of commerce's national policy on air competition, which states competition in Canada "is desirable and should be encouraged." The committee says competition should be "economically sound" and have no "indirect adverse effects on existing routes served either by the new or the established carrier." ADVERSE EFFECTS: The committee's proposal said airline service in the Maritimes would be adversely affected if national competition was introduced at this time. Commenting on the proposal, the chamber's national general manager, C.H. Schofield of Montreal, said competition in the Maritimes "might induce the present carrier or a new competitor to give a less frequent and inferior service." Mr. Schofield said the committee may find it difficult to get the chamber to change its national policy. "The profit-making areas—central Canada—will be in favor of leaving the policy as it is. It is possible that support for the Maritime proposal will come from western Canada," he said.
