This is believed to be the first time a criminal convicted of perjury has been released on such flimsy bail.

HOW HE ESCAPED.—A Halifax despatch says that a few days ago a soldier, in company with his wife or lady friend, was driven in a cab to a house in the South end, which the couple entered, and the cab waited. In a short time the soldier issued from the house, clad in female habiliments, with the bustle, parasol and complete outfit. Accompanied by the female, the disguised warrior entered the cab and they were driven to the Boston steamer, getting away all right.

Cardigan Notes.

There are ten schooners and the brig. Concan loading with potatoes, oats, turnips, &c., at Cardigan Bridge.

Trade is lively and prices are fairly good. Potatoes bring from 22 to 25 cents; oats 32 cents; turnips 18 to 20 cents.

Considerable excitement arose around the Bridge when it was found out that the schr. Robert D. Rhodes, loaded by Wm. Minto, Esq., and all ready for St. Pierre, had been seized by Arch. McNeill, Esq., Charlottetown, for a debt alleged to be due by the owner of the vessel. On Tuesday morning, the Sheriff's deputy proceeded on board, and placed the broad arrow on the schooner; and, notwithstanding the fact that the captain had the stars and stripes hoisted on his highest spar, and that the wind whistled fair, in defiance of the Robert D. Rhodes remains until the matter is settled.

Notes at Georgetown.

In the County Court, Georgetown, the cases were few. One of some interest to farmers was brought by a banker of Toronto on a note given to a cloth agent, who promised that tailors should follow to convert the cloth into suits. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

International Marine Conference.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.

About 11 o'clock this morning the delegates to the International Marine Conference gathered in the ante-room of the State Department and exchanged courtesies and greetings. The delegates, accompanied by the Ministers of their respective countries, at five minutes after eleven o'clock were ushered into the department parlor by Assistant Secretary of State Adee in the order of precedence of their Ministers. The American delegates were headed by Admiral Franklin. The proceedings were held in the strictest seclusion. The members of the various delegations were presented to Mr. Blaine by their respective ministers. At the conclusion a brief address of welcome was read by Secretary Blaine. Admiral Franklin was chosen President of the Conference. This concluded the proceedings in the State Department, when Secretary Blaine and Sir Julien Pauncefot, British Minister at the head of the delegation, went to the White House, and were presented to President Harrison who made a brief address of welcome.

A Big Railway Trust.

CHICAGO, Oct. 16.

Under the headline, "Huntington's Trust," the Tribune this morning announces the practical completion of a gigantic consolidation scheme of all the Gould and Huntington systems and the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe system, including some of the lines between Kansas City and Chicago, to afford the lines west of Missouri River a direct and independent outlet to Chicago. All the lines west of the Missouri River, south of the lines of the Kansas Pacific branch of the Union Pacific, excepting the Rock Island and western extension, will be controlled by the Huntington and Gould combination. The total length of lines operated by the new combination will be 27,096 miles, or nearly one-sixth of the total railroad mileage in the United States.

News From Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Oct. 17.

Senator Hardisty, of the Northwest Territory, died in Winnipeg yesterday. He was 58 years old, and a factor of the Hudson Bay Company.

Mr. Purcell, M. P. for Glengary, is seriously ill.

In Joliette county, to-day, Bazinet (Liberal) and Perrault (Conservative) were nominated as candidates for the Quebec Legislature.

Watering Sugar.

OTTAWA, Oct. 16.

A wholesale grocer, who is also a large shareholder in a sugar refinery, is authority for the statement that the sugar turned out of some of the refineries is watered after it is refined and before being put into barrels in order to increase its weight. The merchant says he has protested against the proceeding in the interest of dealers and consumers, but without effect.

A Disastrous Explosion.

LONDON, Oct. 16.

An explosion occurred in Rentilee colliery, at Longton, County Stafford, this morning. Seventy miners were in the pit and only eleven are alive. The pit was completely wrecked, and the task of getting out the buried miners will be one of great difficulty. Fifty-five bodies have been taken out by searching parties.

Another World's Exhibition.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Oct. 16.

The directors of the Exhibition Association this afternoon held a meeting and discussed at some length whether they would hold a Maritime, Dominion or an exhibition open to the world next year, and it was finally decided in favor of the latter.

The Amherst Burglary.

AMHERST, N. S., Oct. 16.

Campbell was up before Judge Morse to-day and pleaded guilty to the charge of robbing E. S. McLeod's store. He will be sentenced to-morrow. The examination of Brophy was concluded before Justice Davis who committed him for trial.

To Have Half Pay.

OTTAWA, Oct. 16.

Sir Hector Langevin to-day promised the printers who were lately discharged from the Government bureau that they should have half pay for the unemployed portion of their three months engagement.

OTTAWA, Oct. 16.

Messrs. John F. Stairs and William Black, of Halifax, arrived here to-day. They are looking after the contract for the West India steamship service. Tenders were opened some days ago.
