The book was then read to the people, and Josiah proceeded to destroy all the pagan idols and altars of Judah and killed the preachers of corruption. For the first time in many years, Passover was celebrated.—II Kings 23:1-22

When the Pharaoh Necho of Egypt started to take his armies through what Josiah considered holy land, on his way to battle the Babylonians, Josiah challenged him and was killed.—II Kings 23:29-30

Damage Suit Being Heard At S'ide

SUMMERSIDE — A civil action for damages was heard in Supreme Court at Summerside yesterday before Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell. The plaintiff, James A. Morrison of Summerside is suing for \$602 damages incurred as the result of a collision with a government snowplow Jan. 7, 1962 near Hazel Grove.

R.S. Hinton QC is representing the plaintiff while defence counsel is Gerald R. Foster QC. The accident occurred on the old Charlottetown road near the Hazel Grove school. Mr. Morrison, with three passengers in his car was travelling to work at a Charlottetown in an easterly direction. As his car crossed over the brow of a hill near the Hazel Grove school, he was in collision with the snowplow, which was reported to be on the wrong side of the highway and difficult to see. The plow was travelling in the opposite direction.

Morrison's car struck the blade of the plow, and the car was rolled over on its side, causing an estimated \$602 damages. There were no injuries. Five Crown witnesses testified yesterday the three passengers, a damage estimator employed by the town of Summerside and the RCMP officer who investigated the accident.

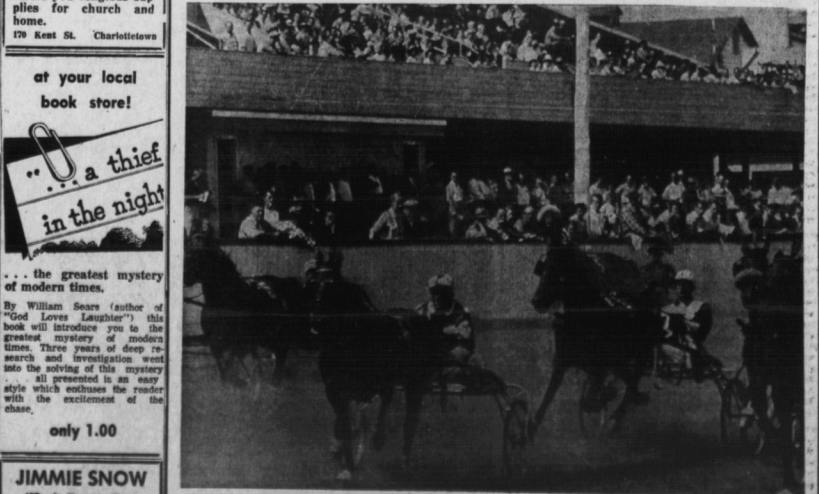
W. MacKay Is Appointed To New Post
