**Literary Notes.** The Westminster Review for August is full of entertaining and pleasant reading. W. J. O'Neill Daunt discusses the condition of "Ireland Under Grant's Parliament." J. B. Firth has a notable paper on the development of the English novel, entitled "Some Aspects of Sentiment." F. W. Haine discusses "The Modern Protective System." There is an interesting series of "Glimpses of Tom Moore," contributed by J. Petrie O'Byrne. Frederick Reuter has a thoughtful paper on "Education in Germany." George Greenwood argues "The Ethics of Field Sports." T. Rice Holmes has a caustic paper on "Mr. Froude and His Critics." Robert Ewen discusses "Unfettered Banking," and the number concludes with its usual complete and valuable summary of "Contemporary Literature," a department which distinguishes the Westminster from all other reviews, and in which it has achieved an enviable reputation for scholarship and reliability. New York: Leonard Scott Publication Co.

The Nineteenth Century for August opens with contributions by eight prominent men, who give at some length their reasons for voting for Mr. Gladstone. The writers are Sir Thomas Farrer, the Master of University College, Oxford; Sir William Markby, Professor Alfred R. Wallace, Mr. H. G. Hewlett, the Rev. H. Russell Wakefield, Professor Minto and the Dean of Westminster. They make a strong case for the Liberal leader, and are extremely interesting as a varied expression of opinion on the current political question. Colonel Kennedy Herbert writes entertainingly on "The Art of Dining," a most important art from his point of view. Mr. W. Fraser Rae has a well-informed article on "The Egyptian Newspaper Press." Dr. Jean Paul Ritcher contributes a valuable paper on Art Studentship of the Early Renaissance Painters." Mr. Archibald Forbes' article on "The French Emperor and the German War" is alternately thrilling and pathetic. The Governor of Tasmania discusses "Lending Money to Australia." Princes Kropotkin continues his studies in "Recent Science" in an eminently readable paper. C. S. Loch writes on "The Confusion in Medical Charities." Edward Dickey discusses the results of the recent election in a paper on "The Verdict of England." There are articles by Charles F. Goss on "Mule Hassan," by Major Willoughby Verker on "Dungeness or Dover" a remarkable account of "A Trial by Lynch Law" by R. B. Townsend, and a most interesting series of "Notes of a Virginian Journey" by E. S. Neal, an American gentleman whose numerous contributions to American periodicals have given him a wide reputation. **Boston Markets.** BOSTON, Aug. 27. Eggs—Receipts of choice fresh stock have been light, and all such lots have met with a ready sale. Since Monday 21c. has been the general price for best fresh laid Michigan and Provincial with choice white firm at about 20c. Eastern fresh laid extra firm at 22c. Held stock is selling fairly at 18 and 19c. POTATOES.—Receipts have been light for the past three days and prices have been ruling higher. Best Bristol Ferry stock selling at \$2.25. Natives running rather small and rarely good enough to bring over \$2.00. Bulk stock in limited supply and choice Rose and Hebrons selling at 70c. per bush. FISH.—There is a good supply of medium and small codfish, but receipts of large are still moderate and such lots meet with a ready sale at full prices: Bbl herring hold about steady. Receipts of mackerel have been larger and quality better. **The Record Holders.** THE KINGS AND QUEENS OF THE TROTTERY TURF OF THE CENTURY. Trotting horses, by breeding, have improved with years, both in speed and beauty. The first champion of the trotter was patriotically named Yankee, but his gait was never over a second faster than three minutes. There were successors to the title, the record improving all the time. In '44 Lady Suffolk accomplished a mile in 2m. 20 1/2. The Lady was queen for several years. Tacoma followed, preceding Flora Temple, after whom came Dexter, who is still remembered by others besides horse lovers and horsemen. Dexter's successor was the handsome Goldsmith Maid. Badd Doble, who brought the present track queen under the wire record breaker, held the reins over the "Maid" in three heats better than 2m. 20a. at Buffalo in '71. Her best mark was 2:14. She beat Rarus when in her prime, but Rarus went her record three-quarters of a second better in 78. Rarus came to St. Julian and then the great Maud S, who reigned with the exception of one day, when Jay Eye See, was king, from '79 to '91. Maud S brought the mark away down to 2:08 1/2. Sunol's performance of 2:04 stopped Maud's career as queen. And Badd Doble with a Boston horse performed a similar act for Robert Bonner's stead. Following is a tabulated history of the lowering of the record: 1806, Yankee, 2:09; 1810, Boston Horse, 2:48; 1830, Buster, 2:32; 1834, Edwin Forrest, 2:31 1/2; 1840, Dittlerman, 2:30 5/8; 1844, Lady Suffolk, 2:26 1/2; 1853, Tacoma, 2:25 1/2; 1856, Flora Temple, 2:24 1/4; 1859, Flora Temple, 2:19 1/2; 1867, Dexter, 2:17 1/2; 1874, Goldsmith Maid, 2:14; 1878, Rarus, 2:13 1/2; 1879, St. Julian, 2:12 1/2; 1880, Maud S, 2:10 1/2; 1881, Maud S, 2:10 1/2; 1884, Jay Eye See, 2:10; 1884, Maud S, 2:09 1/2; 1885, Maud S, 2:08 1/2; 1891, Sunol, 2:08 1/2; 1892, Nancy Hanks, 2:07 1/2. An analysis of the mile furnishes some interesting facts. The first quarter was timed in 31 1/2 seconds, or a 2:06 gait; the next quarter's record was 32 1/2, a 2:09 clip, or, for the distance travelled, half a mile, 2:07 1/2. The third quarter was the slowest, 32 1/2, showing a full mile at that rate in 2:11, at an average of 32 1/4, or nearly 2:09 for the whole distance. Then came the astonishing part of the performance. In the face of a head wind the last quarter was done in 30 1/2, a gait of 2:03, and it was only this tremendous burst of speed which enabled the game mare to then reduce the comparatively slow average of the second and third quarters and bring the mark for the mile to the world's record of 2:07 1/2. It is safe to say that never was the last quarter of a mile, which was fast, under any circumstances trotted in such speed. It is the best demonstration of the staying qualities of the mare, especially when it is remembered that at this tremendous pace and with all the urging at Doble's command, she never so much as lifted her feet for a skip. **Piracy and Murder.** A strange story of piracy and murder in the Pacific is related by the London Times, upon the authority of the Japanese newspapers. A few months ago the schooner Undine, of 180 tons burden, owned, it is believed, by Mr. Crawford, of San Francisco, sailed from that port for the South Sea Islands in command of a Captain Castella. The vessel's complement consisted of the master, mate, five men before the mast, a supercargo, and the steward, all shipped at San Francisco. The vessel touched at Honolulu, and while lying there a man called on board and asked leave to accompany the cruiser to the South Seas. He announced himself as the brother of the pilot at once informed the authorities, readily granted. About two days out from Honolulu one of the two brothers shot the captain in cold blood in his cabin, and the same fate befel the supercargo on his going below to discover the trouble. The rest of the men were then called aft, and, it is said, were plied with poisoned liquor. All were made away with by the two brothers, excepting the steward, who is said to have been offered a bribe of \$1,000 to keep silence. The men further threatening him with death if he revealed the horrible tale. Touching at an island, a crew of natives were shipped to take the place of the murdered men, and the cruiser then proceeded to the Ascension Islands. A pilot was engaged to take the vessel into one of the harbors there, and to him the steward seems to have disclosed the details of the murder of the unfortunate Castella and his men. On getting ashore the pilot at once informed the authorities, the vessel was boarded by soldiers and the two pirate brothers arrested and placed in irons, being afterwards conveyed to Manila in one of the Government mail boats. It is currently reported and believed in the islands that this is not the only case of the kind which has recently occurred there.


