

Meeting of Grand Lodge, I.O.O.F.

(From our own Correspondent.)

SUMMERSIDE, Aug. 12.

DURING the past week the members of "Prince Edward" Lodge, I. O. O. F., have been making preparations to receive the members and brethren attending the session of the Grand Lodge of the Maritime Provinces, which opened here on Wednesday the 11th inst. The steamer "St. Lawrence," with a party of excursionists and the band of the 82nd battalion, arrived here from Charlottetown at 1 o'clock on Tuesday. It was at first intended to take a number of excursionists at Summerside on board the steamer to meet the "Princess of Wales" bringing the delegates from New Brunswick. But this scheme was abandoned. Those from the city rambled through the town until the arrival of the "Princess."

On Wednesday at noon, the delegates from Nova Scotia arrived in the tug "Henry Aitken," among whom were the Grand Master and Grand Secretary. The session of the Grand Lodge was held in Ludlow Hall. The ladies' parlor was trimmed off and presented a nice appearance. The first thing to catch your eye as you enter the room is the handsome banner of "Prince Edward" Lodge. Over the Grand Master's chair is a large engraving of the Lord's Prayer, draped with the English and American flags. At the opposite end of the room is another large engraving of the Lord's Prayer, draped with the English and Canadian flags. To the right and left of the Grand Master were two large oil pictures, while these hanging along the walls were nicely trimmed, the whole presenting a fine appearance and reflecting much credit upon the members of "Prince Edward" Lodge. The committee showed good judgment in securing the hall for the use of the Grand Lodge, as it was well provided with rooms for the several committees to meet in. Stipendiary Magistrate's Court.

STEWART VS. LAWSON.

This case was continued yesterday afternoon.

W. D. STEWART, (the prosecutor) testified in effect that he never dealt in any bills of lading except genuine ones and knew nothing about bogus bills of lading concerning the "Fleetwing" or any other vessel. On the direct examination he gave a categorical denial to all the charges relating to the "Fleetwing" made by the "Presbyterian." Cross examined by traverser's counsel he denied any knowledge of the bills of exchange (shown here) drawn on Joshua C. Tomlin, Esq. He first heard of the "Fleetwing" from Tomlin. He knew nothing of the debt alleged to be due Esson & Co., by Pidgeon & Stewart, and nothing of bills of exchange drawn on Esson & Co. He knew that Roome, of Halifax, had been ruined, but did not know that the firm of Pidgeon & Stewart had anything to do with his ruin. He never heard of the "Montezuma" till he saw her name in this newspaper. He did not remember Roome saying anything to him about the "Fleetwing" or her cargo before Tomlin spoke to him about the matter. He discounted certain notes of the Richardson Manufacturing Co., but did so under the instructions of the Company and remitted the money. After hearing Counsel and considering the evidence, the Stipendiary Magistrate decided that the article in question was a libel, and publication thereof being proved, he remanded the traverser for trial at the next term of the Supreme Court.

THE TURF.—One of the prettiest races ever witnessed on Upton Park was the one which took place yesterday between Mr. Robert Crabb's Shyllock, of Charlottetown, and the Messrs. Sullivan's Donald, of Halifax, for \$100 a side, mile heats, best three in five. Messrs. Large, Lamphier and Dr. Creamer were appointed judges. At the start the horses were sent off abreast on the first score, Donald took the lead, but broke at the turn, and was passed by Shyllock. On the backstretch Donald again took the lead, but again broke, and was again passed by Shyllock, who led till the finish, having trotted the whole course in excellent style and without a break. In the second heat Donald led, hotly pursued by Shyllock. On the homestretch the latter colored his opponent, and would have undoubtedly given him the go-by had not Donald swerved, and thus caused Shyllock to break. A foul was claimed on "this ground," but the heat was given to Donald. The third heat was splendidly contested, and won by Shyllock, who assumed the lead at the three-quarter pole, and finished two lengths ahead. The fourth heat was the prettiest of the race. Donald, at the start, showed a good streak of daylight between himself and opponent, but at the half mile shyllock came up splendidly and collared Donald on the turn. They dashed down the backstretch neck-and-neck. At the three-qr. Shyllock led by a neck, and on the homestretch increased the lead to a length. He trotted down the homestretch at a 2.20 gait, and ended a length ahead, and this felled his opponent—Donald out of the heat and race. At the conclusion of the race Mr. A. N. Large verbally challenged any horse in Nova Scotia to a race with Messenger Boy for \$100 a side.

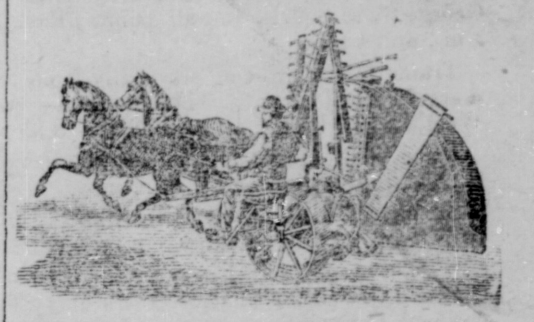
