NOTES FROM THE CAPITAL.

Another Set to St. John.

Sir Oliver's Last Cabinet Meeting.

OTTAWA, Nov. 13.—A meeting of the
cabinet was held yesterday and another
will be held on Tuesday next, at which it
is expected that Sir Wilfrid Laurier will
be present. This is the last cabinet meet-
ing at which Sir Oliver Mowat will
be present, as after he has retired an order
appointing him Lieutenant Governor will
be passed and federal politics will know
him little or no more.
At the meeting held yesterday the cabi-
net decided to give \$15,000 subsidy, which
the Furness line did not accept to, Allan

and London during the winter months.

RECIPROCITY IN THE WIND.

Laurier and Davies in Consul- tation With Washington Politicians.

The Details to be Perfected Later.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—Definite ar-
rangements have been made for taking up
the subject of a reciprocity treaty between
the States and Canada. Meetings will be
held during the visit of Sir Wilfrid
Laurier and Sir Louis Davies and some
common understanding arrived at. The
details are to be perfected later.

DUFFERIN AND RECIPROCITY.

Detrimental to the Empire.

LONDON, Nov. 13.—Sir Charles Dilke,
radical member of Parliament, alluding to
Sir Wilfrid Laurier's presence at Washing-
ton, reminded his hearers, at a meeting
held last evening, that Lord Dufferin,
Governor-General of Canada in 1874,
opposed a reciprocity treaty between
Canada and the United States on the
ground that it would be detrimental to
the trade of the Empire.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

LONDON, Nov. 11.—The Gazette an-
nounces that the Victoria Cross has been
conferred upon Lieutenant Adams and
Lieutenant Fincastle for their gallant at-
tempts to rescue Lieutenant Graves, of the
Lancashire Fusiliers, who was killed
during an engagement between the troops
of General Sir Bindon Blood and the tribes-
men in the Swat valley on August 17 last,
and also upon Lieut Costello for a success-
ful rescue during an engagement at
Malakand last July.

SIMLA, Nov. 11.—The report that a
native officer and 35 Sikhs, belonging to the
Kurran column, had been intercepted by
tribesmen in a ravine and slaughtered, is
officially confirmed. It appears that they
were assisting in reconnoitre upon the
Curma river. Taking a short cut down
hill they came to a ravine where the grass
of the jungle was burning. The flames
spread so rapidly as to completely cut off
their retreat, and the tribesmen seeing
their predicament, swarmed on the higher
ground, hurled down rocks upon them and
closed round the men until the whole 36
were shot or cut down. The Sikhs fought
heroically until the very last, their officer
killing two rebel chiefs with his own hand
before he fell.

ROME, November 11.—The Papal Nun-
cio at Madrid has been recalled to Rome
by the Vatican, and instructed to exhort
the clergy and people of Spain to do their
utmost to support the present dynasty.
News has reached the Vatican that the
situation in Spain is extremely grave.

Carlism is imminent in the prin-
cipal towns of Spain, and the Queen
Regent is continually receiving menacing
letters from the Carlism. It is understood
that Spain's situation is the subject of
negotiations between the European cabi-
nets.

WINNIPEG, Man., November, 12.—
Despatches from Regina and Elkhorn say
there is no truth in the reports of an
Indian uprising. There are no Piegan
Indians in the locality nearer than Saskat-
chewan.

LONDON, Nov. 11.—Lord George Hamil-
ton, Secretary of State for India, in a speech
at Acton, last evening, defended the
"forward policy" pursued in India during
recent years against attacks lately made
upon it by Mr. John Morley, Mr. Herbert
Asquith, (Home Secretary in the last
Liberal Government), and other Liberal
leaders. He justified this policy on the
ground that while checking the Russian
advance toward India, it enabled Russia
and Great Britain to arrive at an amicable
understanding by which their respective
frontier and spheres of influence were
being fixed, each recognizing that
there was ample room in Asia
for the legitimate expansion of
both empires. He spoke very guardedly
of the future of the frontier policy, urging
that "our chief object is to concentrate our
strength on essential routes and positions
accepting elsewhere the general submission
of the tribes as an acknowledgement of
British supremacy, interfering as little as
possible in their local affairs, and trusting
for the rest to the civilized influences of
trade gradually to win the tribes from
their predatory instincts."

The Times, commenting editorially on
Lord George Hamilton's speech, says that
it was the part of wisdom to "refrain
from more explicit statements which
would only leave a loophole for Radical
attacks," and will suggest as a means of
attaining the desired ends, the extension of
the railway to the Afghan frontier along
the valley of the Kabul River.

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—J. C. Nolan, who
has just been elected a member of the
Legislative Council of Jamaica, arrived
here on the Atlas liner Altia, from Port
Limon and Kingston, yesterday morning.
"When the executive council convenes in
February next," he said, "I intend to move
for the appointment of a delegation to the
United States to urge the adoption of a
reciprocity treaty between the United
States and Jamaica. Affairs in Jamaica
are in a deplorable condition. We shall
have to face a deficit this year of \$150,000
or \$200,000, and we are very anxious for
a treaty. Our sugar indus-
try is in a depressed state
owing to the beet sugar competition and
our other products have been hit hard by
the high tariff of the United States. Jam-
aica can now proceed to make this treaty
independently of Great Britain. Recently
Great Britain announced the discontinuance
of her most favored nation treaty with
Germany and Belgium. After the treaty
shall have expired some months hence,
each self governing colony of Great Britain
will be free to make its own tariff arrange-
ments. If the United States will not enter
into a treaty with Jamaica, then we
shall have to subsidize a fleet of fast
steamers to England, because we can find a
better market there for our fruits and other
commodities than we can in the United
States under the high tariff."

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—At to-day's
Behring Sea conference the report of Prof.
Lucas upon the habits of the seal was read,
as was also the report of Messrs Jordan,
Thompson and Macoun. The report of
Professors Jordan and Thompson had not
been exchanged heretofore. The papers
led to considerable discussion, which was,
generally speaking, of an amicable charac-
ter although some marked differences of
opinion were expressed.

It is officially announced that the disease
which has appeared in the Jalandhar
district of the Punjab is true bubonic
plague. A cordon has been drawn round
the village of Khatkarhalan, the seat of
infection. Plague has also appeared at
Hubli and Wai, on the road to
Mahabaleswar. At Poona 394 cases are
reported from the hospitals and 115 at
Bombay. The plague is reported to be
again increasing in Hardwa, Poona, and
Surat. Madras is now quite free from the
disease.
