

Bubby Dowling Increases Lead To 4 In Pro Tourney

ST. JOHN, N. B. (CP)—Eugene Mealy of Westfield Club fired a brilliant two-over-par 72 on 18 holes Tuesday to head the amateur class after two day's play in the 32nd New Brunswick Prince Edward Island golf championship.

Junior defender Errol Nicholson of Charlottetown was the third to take in on the chin. He fired a 73 to slip to fourth place with 167.

Bill Hutchison of Riverside was the first with 157, followed by John Estabrooks of Westfield with 158 and Doug Sanders from Riverside with 160.

The three low scores at the end of the three day tournament will be chosen to play in Willingdon Cup competition at Edmundston, N.B. next month.

Steele has already drawn a berth for his performance at trials held recently at St. Andrews, N.B.

In the professional circle, Charlottetown's Cecil Dowling closed 18 holes in 71 strokes to cut two off his 73 opener. He has a total of 144 and a four-stroke lead over runner-up Don Sinclair of Riverside.

Last year's professional and open champion, John Smith, of Truro, shot a 78 Monday and duplicated the feat Tuesday but declined to withdraw from competition.

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BEATS KROLL

Jack Burke Jr. Cops P.G.A. Title

CANTON, Mass. (AP)—Stretch-runner Jack Burke Jr., turned a balky putter into a blade of blazing steel Tuesday for a comeback 3-and-2 victory over Ted Kroll which added the U. S. Professional Golfers Association title to his Masters championship.

The seven previous holes had been halved—the 27th through the 33rd—as the hole to the finisher shot stroke for stroke in even par golf. Burke, once up, refused to give ground.

It was the second bitter disappointment for the plighted 37-year-old Kroll who blew a chance to win the U. S. Open last month in Rochester, N. Y., taking a three-over-par seven on the 70th hole when he needed only pars in to beat Cary Middlecoff.

From three-down at one stage, he quickly reversed the trend to take a two-hole lead at the 27th which he stubbornly refused to relinquish.

Burke's rallying victory, which excited a crowd of 4,000 on the Blue Hill Country Club course, was patterned after his semifinal triumph Monday over Ed Furgol, in which he was five down at one

stage before he spurred to win on the 37th.

The holes ran out for Kroll on the 18-7 yard par-three 34th, where the Florida professional hooked his tee shot wide of the green, chipped 10 feet past the hole and took a one-over-par four, losing to Burke's par three.

The new champion nailed five birdies in six holes, starting at the 20th, and four birdies in a row—from the 24th through the 28th.

Miss Driscoll defeated Mrs. W. Cotton of Charlottetown and Miss Lohnes whipped Mrs. G. R. Greenough of Charlottetown.
