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Bridgetown War Veteran Dies In P.E.I. Hospital

The death occurred in the Veterans Wing of the Prince Edward Island Hospital, Charlottetown on Wednesday, Aug. 18, of James Hugh Skinner of Bridgetown in his 82nd year.

The late Mr. Skinner had been in ill health for the past number of years and had been a hospital patient continuously since January last.

The deceased was born in Cape Breton, N.S., but came to Prince Edward Island at an early age. As a young man he was employed in Toronto and Regina and prospected and homesteaded in Western Canada and the Northwest Territories. He was a veteran of the first World War, having enlisted in the Canadian Army Expeditionary Force in Regina on Oct. 7, 1915 and served in France as a member of the Royal Canadian Army Service Corps until his discharge on April 30, 1918.

Following his discharge he resided at his home in Georgetown while he at one time held a position of King's County jailer.

In 1939 he married Miss Mary Ladner Morrison and since then has resided at Bridgetown.

He was a member of the Canadian Legion and for over 50 years a member of St. George's Masonic Lodge A.F. and A.M. Georgetown. He was a former town councillor.

In politics he was an ardent worker on behalf of the Liberal party.

Since the close of the First World War he was active in Canadian Legion and War Veterans Affairs and never failed, if his health permitted, to attend and take a leading role in the annual Remembrance Day celebrations.

He is survived by his wife, the former Mary Ladner Morrison of Bridgetown, one brother, Daniel, of Georgetown and three sisters, Beatrice and Mrs. Laura Lavers, both of Georgetown and Jessie, Mrs. Reuben Glidden of Nantuxet, Mass.

The funeral was held on Friday, Aug. 20, from MacLean's Funeral Home to Holy Trinity Anglican Church, Georgetown.

Veterans of both World Wars from Georgetown and vicinity attended in a body and held their traditional services at the graveside. Members of St. George's Masonic Lodge also attended in a body and held service at the graveside.

Rev. W. G. Hogg, priest in charge of Holy Trinity Church, conducted the religious service in the Church and at the grave. Honorary pall bearers were: Col. F. B. Conrad, Col. D. M. Bell, Major W. L. Jenkins, Dr. R. D. MacNeill, all of Charlottetown, and Mr. J. H. MacDonald and Capt. J. J. Fitzgerald of Georgetown and Mr. Joseph G. Campbell of Poplar Point. Active pall bearers, all of whom were First World War veterans, were: Michael Burke, Sr., A. H. Stewart, Frank MacLean, Havelock Stewart, John C. Gotell and Herbert George St. John.

Interment was in Holy Trinity Church Cemetery, Georgetown, A.C.

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Canadian Development of Guided Missiles Reported In Final Stages

OTTAWA (CP)—Canadian development of an air-to-air guided missile is in its final stages, defence officials said Friday.

For nearly four years, scientists have been working at the Canadian Armament Research and Development Establishment at Valcartier, Que., to produce a guided missile to arm fighter aircraft.

It is hoped that the missile will be at least part of the answer to the threat of long-range jet bombers.

One authority said that rapid progress has been made in aircraft development since the Second World War but that there has been little advance up to now in aircraft armament.

SEE HIGH RATE OF KILLS Canada's new missile is not the be-all and end-all of fighter aircraft armament. But, if first tested from within a certain range, its rate of kills probably will be extremely high.

The missile can be carried by either the CF-100 long-range jet interceptor or the Sabre jet fighter.

The weapon itself has not yet been fired, though working models have. When it is, the RCAF probably will use pilotless jet aircraft as test targets for the missiles at its new \$30,000,000 weapons range at Cold Lake, Alta.

If any potential enemy knew the exact range of the weapon, it would be possible for him to determine its vulnerable points and

Gov't Post For Brigadier OTTAWA, (CP) — Brig. C. S. Booth, 57, senior Canadian representative to the International Civil Aviation Organization at Montreal, has been appointed assistant deputy minister of transport, it was announced yesterday.

His responsibilities in the newly-created post will include supervision of administration, legal, financial and other services, the announcement said.

A native of England who came to Canada in 1912 and was educated in law at Winnipeg, Brig. Booth is a veteran of two world wars. In 1944 he was elected Liberal member of Parliament for Winnipeg North.

During his period in that office he served from 1940 to 1945 overseas.

In the First World War he served overseas with the Western University battalion of the Canadian Expeditionary Force and with the R.A.F. in north Russia.

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Island Odds and Ends

The City block bounded by Queen, Richmond, Pownall, and Grafton streets may, in the not distant future, become a hollow husk, or partially so. There is a proposition afoot to clear a number of the old buildings out of the interior of the block to make a parking lot for shoppers.

A number of prominent Queen Street merchants are known to have discussed the plan. For a few days men with tape and note books busied themselves in the vicinity measuring and jotting down figures. Since then nothing has been heard, but it is said the proposal is only in abeyance and has not been dropped.

There is ample room in the interior of the block for the purpose intended.

The scramble for car berths along our city streets has reached the point where there is not enough room in the downtown area to go around when traffic is heavy. Too many shoppers are finding themselves parked out on the perimeter of the business section of the town, when they want to be conveniently parked at its hub.

When representatives of the United Air Force were in Charlottetown a few days ago recruiting men and women to work at air bases in Labrador Greenland and Newfoundland more than one hundred people applied for jobs. Of this large number only twelve were successful, in obtaining positions, and there was great disappointment among the rejected.

The high number of rejections arose when many of the applicants proved to be laborers and carpenters, whereas the recruiting agents had advertised for diesel mechanics, heavy equipment operators, plumbers clerks and stenographers.

Most of the disappointed ones disregarded the wording of the newspaper advertisement, and were unable to fill the fairly tough requirements. The men who were finally selected, were obliged to give proof of being journeyman tradesmen, with at least five years experience. In this non-industrial area not too many men of this kind are foot-loose in mid-summer.

The recruiters did not lower their standards to any extent. When the interviews, and the medical examinations which followed a successful interview were over, only six men and six women survived the test.

Let's Talk It Over While a patient is waiting for a major operation, sometimes he receives temporary medical aid to tide him over until he can be more or less permanently patched up. It would be fine if the Summerside town fathers, in their role of highway surgeons, could follow this same procedure with some of the paved. It is encouraging to know that help is just around the corner, but, in the meantime, cars crossing Upper Granville and Russell, to cite two examples, look like canoes riding dangerous rapids. Some sort of temporary fill would be welcomed, even if it lasted only a few weeks.

We started from Summerside to Charlottetown recently via the Trans-Canada Highway and for about three-quarters of the way, rolled effortlessly over the smooth new pavement. Then came the detours. It reminded us a little of the games patterned after "Parcheesi" where, if you land on a certain space, the instruction is: "Go back five spaces."

A really intricate labyrinth of branch roads takes you about fifteen miles out of your way over some typically beautiful stretches of Island land and seascapes. We were in no hurry and enjoyed every minute of it. We can imagine others feeling the same way.

But in the case of travel-weary tourists, anxious to get placed for a night's rest, the detour situation might rankle a little. It would be wise to direct such visitors to take the old, rough but ready highway.
