WASHINGTON, Sept. 23 —(AP)—Mobilization Director Charles E. Wilson has ordered all major aluminum producers to plan at once to remove their plants from the Pacific northwest because of a prospective power shortage there.

Wilson authorized the companies to move their plants from the west coast to the south, east or other sections unless there is rapid improvement in the west coast's power outlook.

The five producing plants in Oregon and Washington and two planned plants in Washington and Montana represent an investment of about \$170,000,000 and provide roughly half the United States aluminum supply.

HELSINKI, Sept. 21—(Reuters)—Finland has sent Russia \$211,300,000 worth of reparations goods during the last seven years, the State Reparations Board announced today. Originally Finland undertook to send Russia \$300,000,000 worth of goods over six years. Russia later extended the period to eight years. Just before Finland's general elections in 1948 Russia waived the remaining amounts due.

LONDON, Sept. 21—(Reuters)—Plans for a vast network of supersonic jet airliners stretching throughout the British Commonwealth will be discussed next week in London when delegates from all Commonwealth nations will study traffic-control and airfield arrangements for regular services for 44-seater planes flying at 500 miles an hour. U. S. Steel Report

CLEVELAND, O., Sept. 23 — (AP)—Steel production was the highest in a month last week, Steel magazine reports today, but a shortage of scrap has producers worried about maintaining the pace.

The national ingot operating rate went up one point to 101 per cent of capacity. That's exactly what it was one year ago, but capacity was substantially smaller then, the weekly magazine of metalworking says.

The demand for steel is the greatest in the industry history, Steel says, and most mills will enter the fourth quarter with substantial arrears and little chance of catching up on orders during the period.

Carloadings

OTTAWA, Sept. 21 — (CP) — Carloadings on Canadian railways increased during the week ended Sept. 15 to 86,822 cars compared with 73,021 cars in the previous week but was down from the 88,029 cars for the corresponding week last year.

The Bureau of Statistics reported today that increases over last year were shown in loadings of grain and grain products, ore, pulpwood and paper. Again recessions were registered in livestock, coal, and lumber.

Heroic Engineer Who Saved 200 Passengers From Serious Injury Is Close To Death



Two hundred people, passengers on the crack Chicago-Toronto flyer, will long remember engineer Fred Chubb of London, Ont., as the man whose fast thinking saved them from possible serious injury when the C.P.R. train crashed into a truck near Chatham, Ont. Critically injured and fighting for his life in an oxygen tent, Chubb threw on the train's emergency brakes seconds before the locomotive and tender plowed through the truck, which was carrying a low-slung trailer used for hauling heavy machinery. Force of collision was so great that it tipped the locomotive on its side, derailed a baggage car and three passenger cars and tore up 150 yards of track. Witnesses said the engineer's quick application of the brakes saved scores of passengers from injury in crash which claimed the life of the truck driver and fireman.
