

# Consultation On Street Work Returns Two Side Councilors

 Considerable criticism was expressed by two members of the street committee chairman Grant Mollison and George Key Jr. concerning work done on Victoria Road at the regular monthly council meeting here last night.

Coun. Mollison said he was "very much perturbed" that he, as street committee chairman, had not even been aware that work was being done on the street until he saw it and added that in the town council this year Victoria Road was not even mentioned as one of the streets to be worked on.

Town Manager Joseph Brophy said he had given the go ahead on MacEwen Road "Let's not fall back on last year's council", he said.

He added the point involved was that there was a street committee and that this committee had met on a number of occasions to discuss proposed projects. He said he was shocked that work such as this would go ahead without the knowledge of the committee.

Coun. Mollison said he was disappointed with the town manager. "We have to answer for this and I hope that it will never be done again without my knowledge while I'm on council", he said.

He said that there were no residents where the work had been done and as a result "we'll never be able to get any money and paving in the East Ward where there were residents who would be expected it."

Mr. Brophy, in apologizing said that he had been misled by the policy set by last year's council.

**IRREGULAR SIGN**  
 Coun. Garret Ross asked on whose authority the town council firehall had erected on the north side of the build-

ing rather than on the northwest corner where approval had been given for its erection.

Both Coun. Leo Wood, who is also the fire chief and Mr. Brophy disclaimed any knowledge of its erection on the north side.

Coun. Keys said it was a "very dangerous practice — to go ahead and do something opposite to what the council had approved and whoever is involved should be severely dealt with." He recommended a suspension.

He added "I can hardly credit the fact that grown men would do this and endeavour to hide the fact." Mr. Brophy felt that the matter should be brought to the attention of the police and Coun. Key agreed if the men involved did not come forward.

**DANGEROUS PARKING**  
 The police department was a commended for the fine work done during Lorbart Carval week. A suggestion was made, however, that strict control be maintained on the no-parking zone on Water Street, especially at the intersection.

This was considered dangerous because of the fact that drivers travelling towards Water Street from side streets were unable to observe oncoming traffic and the parked vehicles were the cause of serious accidents.

Another point mentioned was the parking of vehicles on both sides of the one-side parking street. It was suggested that a traffic department enforce this.

Coun. Key mentioned the proposed memorial in honor of the founder of the Island Park Motel, one situated on Holman's Island.

A price quotation of \$799 including all taxes, entered by P. F. Schurman, was accepted by the council and it was suggested that work on the memorial proceed as soon as possible.

**POOR SEWAGE**  
 In replying to a letter from Robert Jardine, secretary of the area Regional High School conference the fact that satisfactory performance of the sewage system at the school and the request

that this problem be cleared up prior to this fall's school term. Coun. Key said it was a "point well taken."

He said that despite the fact that RCAY houses are originally planned for this area would not be erected and a large portion of land, also this area, taken away from the town, it "still had a commitment."

He moved that the town engineer be instructed forthwith to begin construction on a lift pump station to be large enough to also handle Massey Street, Pope Road and all Commerce Crosses and all areas within the town boundaries beyond the height of the land in the future.

**THREE RESOLUTIONS**  
 Three resolutions were passed at the meeting. One was that the tender of Irving Oil Ltd. of \$67 for supplying of an oil-ed, glass-lined water heater for Civic Stadium be accepted. This was the lowest of three tenders entered.

It was also resolved that the town approve the agreement presented by the department of national defence with respect to the collection of taxes of RCAY personnel living in bulk lease housing within the town.

The third resolution asked that tenders be called for a submersible deep-well pumps for the town per specifications required.

Coun. Key said that last year the town had the honor of having the executive council hold a cabinet meeting in Summerdale and suggested that an invitation be extended again this year.

In closing Mayor Jenkins expressed appreciation for the cooperation given by the council, town manager and town employees during Lorbart Carval week. "I have never worked with a more cooperative bunch of people," he said.

## Ferry Traffic Shows Gain

Passenger and vehicle travel at both Borden and Wood Islands for the month of June showed considerable gains over the same period last year.

## Enheat Fight To Continue In Ottawa

A fight to keep the Enheat and Heating Products Limited plant open here will be waged by three parties, the provincial government, the City of Charlottetown and Enheat and Heating itself.

A meeting was held yesterday morning in Premier Walter R. Shaw's office and following the meeting, the chairman, Industry and Natural Resources Minister Leo F. Rossiter said an attempt is being made by representatives of the three groups to meet in Ottawa Wednesday with Federal Minister of Industry, C. M. Drury and the province's representatives in the House of Commons.

The Local Enheat aircraft plant is expected to finish present repair contracts within months and there has been no indication that further defence department contracts for Sabre jets will be forthcoming.

Mr. Rossiter said the federal will impress the need to keep the plant open upon the federal authorities and show the economic benefit it has been to the area. He said there are 50 highly-trained workers at the plant and the province cannot absorb them if the plant closes.

**Winnipeg TB Costs**  
 Not to Be Added

 OTTAWA (CP) — The federal government turned the thumbs down Monday on a proposal to add tuberculosis patient costs to the hospital insurance program until a federal-provincial committee completes study of the country's tax structure.

Health Minister Lucy LaMarsh told reporters after the opening session of the two-day federal-provincial health ministers conference that such a step would add 600,000 a year to a hospital insurance program already expected to cost Ottawa \$200,000,000 in the 1964-65 fiscal year.

"This is no time to get into this sort of thing," she said, noting that the tax structure committee decided on at the March federal provincial conference is to meet soon.

She said the general view is that mental and tubercular patients' hospital bills should be included in the hospital insurance program but "it is a matter of cost."

The provinces expressed preliminary view on the recommendation.

Quebec wasn't ready to go into health insurance even though it recognized the need. Costs, operation and structure had to be studied and provincial jurisdiction was essential.

British Columbia also insisted on provincial autonomy and a structure which would preserve the doctor-patient relationship. Alberta had earlier made known its view that the patient must pay part of the cost.
