Conference Highlights

- OTTAWA (CP) — Highlights of the four-day federal-provincial conference ended Thursday.
- General agreement on a provincially-run medical care program that would meet federal standards of universal coverage.
- Agreement to carry on negotiations over off-shore mineral rights pending court ruling as sought by Ottawa.
- Agreement on Ottawa aid to slow-growth areas with close consultation with the provinces.
- Recognition that revamping may be needed in federal aid to university programs.
- Attorneys' general agreement that fall conference be held to study ways to combat organized crime.
- Recognition of need for national conference soon on methods to fight poverty.
- Action by Ottawa to turn over more tax revenue to provinces from privately-owned electric power and gas companies.
