

Reynolds, Slaughter, Eddy Robinson Star In Yanks Win

New York Yankees edged Chicago 4-3 Thursday to end the White Sox' four-game American League winning streak, while Cleveland Indians used Bill Nixon's wildness and a pair of singles for three first-inning runs and went on to defeat Boston Red Sox 6-3.

Allie Reynolds pitched three hitless innings on relief after pinch singles by Enos Slaughter and Eddie Robinson gave the Yankees their margin.

The 35-year-old "Chief," nailing down Eddie Lopat's third straight triumph, struck out four men in his brilliant effort. Lopat, who left for pinch-hitter Slaughter with men on first and third and two out in the sixth, picked up his 150th major league victory.

The Yankees trailed 4-3 going into

the sixth with Billy Pierce still in control of the game.

SINGLES HOME WINNER
After Phil Rizzuto walked, manager Casey Stengel called for Slaughter who slammed a single to left centre and sent Gil McDougald in to tie the score. Robinson, hitting for Jerry Coleman, drove a single past Ferris Fain into right to send in Rizzuto with the winning run.

The Indians' Dave Philley clouted a long homer into the screen in left centre off reliever Bill Werle in the fifth inning while Mike Garcia limited the Sox to six hits.

Al Rosen, again playing first base with rookie Rudy Regalado holding down third, drove in three of the winners' runs.

One night game was scheduled

in the American League. All three National League encounters were under lights.

Red Kelly Wins Trophies \$6,000 N. H. L. Jackpot

MONTREAL (CP)—Red Kelly of Detroit Red Wings won two trophies and hit the National Hockey League award jackpot for a total of \$6,000, the league announced Thursday night.

The perennial all-star is the first winner of the James Norris Memorial Trophy as the best all-around defenceman, and also copied the Lady Byng Memorial Trophy for exhibiting "the best type of sportsmanship and gentlemanly conduct combined with a high standard of playing ability."

Red, who was christened Leonard Patrick and owns a farm at Simcoe, Ont., is the only player to win two trophies in the NHL's 1953-54 season. He won the Byng Trophy last year as well and three times in four years.

The league's announcement said that not counting his basic salary or any bonus arrangements he may have had with Red Wings, Kelly earned \$6,000 in extra bonuses.

As a member of the Stanley Cup

winning team Kelly pocketed \$3,000. By capturing a place on defence on the first all-star team he acquired \$1,000, and the Norris and Byng trophies each carry \$1,000 in cash.

The NHL commented in a statement it is fitting that a member of Red Wings should be the first winner of the Norris trophy. Mr. Norris bought the team in 1933 and built it into one of the strongest clubs in the history of the circuit.

Kelly, 27-year-old bachelor, won the Norris silverware in a breeze, winning 162 points out of 180, compared to 57 points for Doug Harvey of Montreal Canadiens, in runner-up position. Bill Gadsby, captain of Chicago Black Hawks, finished third with 38 points.

RALEIGH SECOND
Don (Bones) Raleigh, centre and captain of New York Rangers, finished second in the balloting for the Byng Trophy, with 84 points, and Bill Mosienko, veteran Chicago right winger, was third with

28. Mosienko won the trophy in 1944-45. Kelly won 112 out of a possible 180 points.

The 180-point Kelly has been selected to a berth on the first all-star team for the last four years and was a member of the second squad in 1949-50. He was the leading point-getter among defencemen this season with 16 goals and 33 assists—and held the same spot for the last five years.

Voting for both the Norris and Byng trophies was carried out by hockey writers and broadcasters in the six NHL cities.
