

The purchase of the land, erecting the buildings and equipping the farm, would probably require an outlay of about £3000, undoubtedly a large expenditure, but by no means commensurate to the benefits the country would derive from the institution. Your Committee are of opinion that, once fairly started, the farm would sustain itself, leaving the manager's salary the only charge on the public purse, and in a few years even that would be greatly diminished, if not quite covered by its profits. Nor would the capital invested be sunk, as the farm and all its appurtenances belong to the Government, it would, if sold at the end of twenty-one years, from the increased value of property, realize not only the sum invested, but probably leave the regulations and the buildings to be sold or let, and by careful management, capable of being made to yield as profitable a return to the cultivator as in North America; but, from the lightness, by mismanagement, or easily impaired, it is above all things, important that the people of this island should possess the most perfect knowledge of the agricultural art. It therefore becomes to legislators to direct their attention, and a liberal share of the public funds, to the establishment and support of institutions which will enable them to attain it. Trusting that a continuance of our financial prosperity will enable the Government and Legislature to entertain the suggestion, your Committee intend, at the proper time, to submit it for their consideration.

With a few words of advice to the agriculturist, your Committee will now conclude their Report. The progress of the present activity in trade and all the plough must acknowledge the stimulus which the others advocating experience. The superior model and vehicles of our ships, and the improvement in the building and implements turned out from the workshops of our mechanics, attest the advance making in the skill and art necessary to such pursuits. The farmer should catch the contagion and not be found stationary, and contend with mediocrity in the art of his calling. When all around him is advancing, he will not find the present demand and high prices offered for everything the farmer can produce, his only incentive to greater industry and renewed exertion.

The war, which seems about to commence (much as we may lament the calamity) has golden prospects for our peaceful land. The first hostile cannon shot from the allied fleets in the Black Sea will be the signal for a large export of the produce of our high quality agricultural produce. Let, therefore, the farmer speed the plough—increase the depth of his furrow—take care of his manure, and exert himself to secure the high returns for his produce, which the circumstances of the times are placing within his reach.
