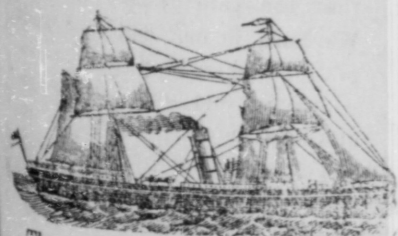

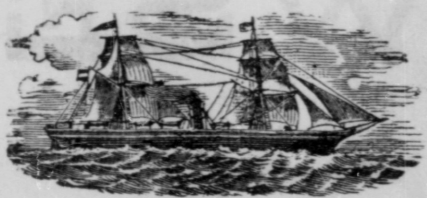

LATEST NEWS FROM CHINA.

Chinese Again Attacking Legations.

BUT CHINESE MINISTER PROPOSES FOR PEACE.

German Warships Sent To Shanghai.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Aug. 15.—A despatch from Shanghai, Aug. 13, says that numerous reports from Pekin, dated Aug. 8, have arrived there describing the situation at the Chinese capital.

It appears that the Chinese are again desperately attacking the legations which have few defenders left.

GERMANS ACTIVE.

BERLIN, Aug. 15.—The correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says: "The German government has ordered two cruisers to Shanghai and another is on the way while a fourth is already there."

"The German government," he states, "evidently determined that England shall not have a free hand in that region."

The Standard, after expressing the opinion that there is increasing ground to hope that the ministers will be rescued by the allies at Pekin tomorrow, Thursday, if the initial rate of progress is maintained, goes on to deal with what will follow the rescue, and says:

"It may be taken for granted that the policy attributed to the Washington cabinet represents the absolute minimum of the demands of the combined powers."

PEACE IN SIX WEEKS.

LONDON, Aug. 15.—The Chinese Minister in London is quoted as saying that he hoped and believed that peace would be established between China and the powers within the next six weeks.

Yesterday he transmitted to the British Foreign Office another message from the British Minister in Pekin, the contents of which the officials have thus far refused to make public.

The Electric Light Co communicated the fact that owing to the increased price of coal street lighting could not be undertaken at the present rates. The Council will confer with the company in the matter. They intimated that they could install the most modern system of arc lighting for the streets. Mr. J. E. Wyatt was retained as prosecuting attorney for the C. T. A.

ROUMANIA AND BULGARIA

Strained Relations Between the Two.

PLOT TO ASSASSINATE KING CHARLES

Discovered in Time But Bulgarian Government Won't Interfere.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Aug. 15.—The real reason of the strained relations between Roumania and Bulgaria says a special despatch from Vienna, is the recent discovery of a plot laid by the Revolutionary Committee in Sofia to assassinate King Charles of Roumania, while attending the requiem for King Humbert at Buchares.

The police got wind of the plot, and warned King Charles who did not attend the service.

Two women, well known in Roumanian society, and a number of Bulgarians have been arrested in Buchares.

Notwithstanding this the Bulgarian Government declines to interfere with the Revolutionary Committee.

—The Recorder of Montreal lately made some observations to the effect that the city authorities would do well to make more provision for play grounds. There are cases and places where playgrounds in cities are more necessary than parks on their outskirts. "The hope of the nation," said the Recorder, "is in the boys, and these should have places to play in, grass to run upon, and, generally, opportunity to enjoy themselves. Under such conditions they are not likely to get into trouble by violating civic ordinances, but will grow up healthy and become good citizens."
