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Canadian Firms Increase Gifts To Charity, Education

MONTREAL (CP)—Gifts by Canadian companies to charities, education and are almost double what they were a year ago, says a report made public today by the National Industrial Conference Board.

The report says its findings on a 1967 study of 229 Canadian companies and describes the "why, how much and who" problems of corporate giving.

Three factors prompting corporate generosity were a feeling of social obligation, self-interest and pressure from within and outside a company.

In general, the report says, companies are mainly interested in causes which benefit their shareholders, the company and the public at large.

But there was often a "humanitarian element" to corporate giving. The fact many companies gave to charities even when times were bad was one example of this.

Pressures from inside companies often came from senior executives interested in a particular cause.

There were 116 daily newspapers in Canada—56 English, 12 French and six in other languages.

Of 1,352 issues traded, 666 advanced and 413 declined. Volume was 5,320,000 shares compared with 5,630,000 Monday.

Auto, Davis, unreported, renewed talk of its upcoming products, was the most active stock, up at 33 1/2. General Motors shares were second, touching a new high as it rose 1 1/2 to 70 1/2. Analysts were further comment about the changeover in its 1964 car models.

Among Canadian issues traded, Aluminium Ltd. gained 1/2, Canadian Pacific Dome Mines 1/2, Granby Mining and Hudson Bay Mining and International Nickel 1/2.

Prices on the American exchange advanced. General Motors, Marcell and Fargo Oil gained 1/2 and Canadian Javelin 1/2. Javelin Oil, J & Scurry Rainbow Oil 1/2.
