Blonde Pilot Ends Flight

LONDON (Reuters) — Blonde pilot Sheila Scott landed her single-engine light plane at London Airport Monday night, completing the longest solo flight ever made around the world.

Miss Scott, the first British pilot to circle the globe alone, took just under 33 days to complete her 28,600-mile journey, at a record average speed of 34 miles an hour, including ground stops.

Summer Camps Start Saturday

Militia and cadet summer camps at Camp Aldershot, N.S., began on Saturday, June 25.

This year there will be a regional camp for Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island militia units; Student Militiamen, Royal Canadian Army Cadets and Militia Schools candidates from the four Atlantic provinces, and a national camp for members of the Canadian Women's Army Corps.

There will be about 200 student militia training at eight local headquarters in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, and a number of militia attachment to both field and static units of the regular force. In addition, several militia units will undergo field training at Canadian Forces Base Gagetown, N.B.

Camp Aldershot is being operated by Headquarters Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island district commander. Aim of the Aldershot summer camp is to provide field training for militia units, to conduct qualifying and trades courses for militia members, including the Canadian Women's Army Corps, Student Militia, Cadet Services of Canada officers, and Royal Canadian Army Cadets.

Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island militia units will attend one of two one-week camps at Aldershot June 25 - July 1.

25TH ANNIVERSARY

About 325 candidates are expected to attend the first national camp for members of the Canadian Women's Army Corps from all parts of Canada except Quebec to be held at Aldershot June 25 - July 8. This year is the 25th anniversary of the forming of the CWAC Aug. 15, 1941.

There will be about 400 candidates attending Militia Schools July 10 - Aug. 5 with courses for majors, lieutenants, senior and junior NCOs, cooks, and a Student Militia Training Wing July 9 - Aug. 12 for members who have passed first year student militiaman standards.

Forty Cadet Services of Canada officers and civilian instructors, and about 950 Royal Canadian Army Cadets from the four Atlantic provinces will carry out summer training for 1966 in Camp Aldershot July 9 - Aug. 19 and a number of CS of C officers and instructors will be attached to the Royal Canadian Signals School at Kingston, Ont.

Three Nova Scotia cadets will participate in the exchange of Caribbean area cadets and 30 cadets from the Barbados will attend Camp Aldershot.

BAND TO BANFF

A number of Nova Scotia cadets including the pipe band of the New Glasgow High School will attend the National Cadet Camp at Banff, Alta., and 20 other cadets will compete in the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association Meet at Ottawa.
