

New Gov't Hint Seen Against Early Voting

OTTAWA (CP) — Another government hint that there may not be an early election was dropped in the Commons Monday.

Transport Minister Balcer said the government "definitely intends" to send a railway bill to a Commons committee. Committees have not yet been set up for the current session of Parliament.

The Commons gave the bill second reading — approval in principle.

It also approved a resolution, preparatory to introduction of a bill, authorizing the CNR to build a 23-mile line west from Whitecourt in northwestern Alberta for the transportation of sulphur.

Mr. Balcer gave the CNR the heartfelt clap on the back that the public-owned company has received in years.

He said the CNR management should be congratulated for the "splendid job" it had done in building the line between Optic and Chisel Lakes for \$6,400,000 after Parliament had authorized expenditure of \$6,440,000 for this purpose.

Good administration and good financial care, the minister said, had shown the CNR can build railways and save money.

Joey Reports Agreement On Former Base

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — Premier Smallwood said Monday an agreement between Newfoundland and Ottawa gives the province a large share of the abandoned United States Pepperell base near here.

Speaking in the legislature, he said the province gets 130 or 140 buildings, including a 400-bed hospital, 105 housing units, three schools, and a large office building.

He said the buildings will be distributed on a priority basis, with the first priority being government need. Other uses for the provincial share of the base would include a welfare centre and schools for retarded children.

The federal share will be used by the armed forces.

Premier Smallwood and Prime Minister Diefenbaker discussed the base at a meeting in Ottawa last week. A conflict arose after the U.S. abandoned the base 18 months ago and both Ottawa and Newfoundland claimed the property.

Gales Cause Destruction And Deaths

LONDON (AP) — Gales battered northwest Europe Monday, leaving a trail of wreckage and causing at least five deaths.

Trees were uprooted, trucks overturned and chimneys, television and radio aerials toppled. Dozens of houses had roofs whipped off by the raging winds.

A gust of 123 miles an hour recorded at Lowther Hill in Lancashire, Scotland, was probably the highest wind force ever recorded in Britain, said the meteorological office.

From the Atlantic to the Baltic, shipping raced for shelter. Even in port they were not safe. At Brunsbuttelkoog, West Germany, the 10,440-ton Panamanian freighter Las Minas tore away from her mooring and collided with a loading crane, which crashed on her foredeck. No one was hurt.

SHIPS COLLIDE

On England's River Tyne, three ships collided after the 7,311-ton ship Marshall parted from her moorings and was blown across the river.

Four of the deaths were in Britain. A nightwatchman was killed by a falling chimney stack at Hull, on the east coast; a 27-year-old motorcyclist was blown into the path of a truck, a 55-year-old Bradford, Yorkshire, woman was killed by a falling chimney, and a 79-year-old man was killed and his daughter injured when gales tore off the roof of their Gateshead, Yorkshire, home.

Police in Duisburg, West Germany, blamed the failure of a wind-damaged crossing barrier for a streetcar accident in which one person died and 32 others were injured. The streetcar and a locomotive collided on a grade crossing.

Blizzards and winds close to hurricane force battered Poland and closed all Polish airports. The meteorological office predicted high winds and snow fall would continue for another 48 hours and might disrupt rail and road communications in Poland.

ABITIBI

Abitibi was one of the individual features, rising 1/4 to 4 1/4 on 4,200 shares after gaining three points last week. The company increased its annual dividend rate to \$2.00 a share from \$1.70 a share last week.

Massey-Ferguson rose 1/4 to 13 1/4 on a volume of more than 15,000 shares. Southam added a point to 30 1/4 and Traders Finance A gained 1/4 to 53.

International Nickel rose 1/4 to 8 1/4 among base metals. Asbestos fell 1/4 to 23.

Among papers, Consolidated Paper gained 1/4 to 42 1/4 and MacMillan added 1/4 to 19. Moore dropped 1/4 to 55 1/4.
