P.E.I. Juniors Play Manitoba

WINNIPEG (CP) - Newfoundland will face Saskatchewan in the first game of the inaugural national junior baseball tournament here Thursday, July 29.

The schedule for the five-day competition was released Thursday.

Other games: Friday, July 30 - Alberta vs. Nova Scotia; Saturday, July 31 - Quebec vs. New Brunswick; Prince Edward Island vs. Manitoba on Sunday, Aug. 1; Newfoundland - Saskatchewan on Monday, Aug. 2; final consolation games will be played July 31, Aug. 1 and Aug. 2.

Bob Picken, president of the Greater Winnipeg Junior Baseball League, said at least four major league clubs will have scouts at the tournament - St. Louis Cardinals, Minnesota Twins, Milwaukee Braves and Houston Astros.

Seven of the eight provinces will be represented by all-star teams. Each team will carry 18 players, 12 of whom must be under 21 as of Jan. 1, 1965 and six under 19 as of Oct. 1, 1965. Eighteen of the players who are under 19 will be selected for the Canadian team that will compete in the international junior baseball tournament in Mexico in October.

Recently I have spotted quarter and half brown bunnies skipping along the edge of wood roads where they were practically an unknown quantity for the past two years. It was an ideal summer for young of the wild kindred. No downpours of a mixture of hail and rain driven by a biting nor-easter or days that were dull and chill.

Evidence is piling up that we have two non-native animals in the north shore section of the province. Casts of a footprint indicate we have a Lynx on our hands. A report from Ottawa is expected shortly on the identity of the animal that made the footprints. The other, and there is another, has all the characteristics of a Wolverine. It is described as being short legged and built close to the ground. Its size and coloring also bear the wolverine theory out. A large German Police dog was killed by some animal. It was not torn to any extent but every bone in its body appeared to have been broken. 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Hopes For TV Football Are Being Kept Alive

OTTAWA (CP) - Hopes for Canadian Football League television in Eastern Canada at least, are being kept alive but time is running out.

Dr. Andrew Stewart, chair man of the Board of Broadcast Governors said in an interview Thursday night the board will consider a special public hearing on a proposed seven-station independent network to carry games in Eastern Canada.

When the special network proposal first was announced Wednesday, Dr. Stewart said the application must come before a public hearing and the hearing was not scheduled until Sept. 14.

But Jean Paul Champagne, vice president of Bouchard, Champagne, and Pelletier, the Montreal advertising agency that holds tv rights to all CFL games said Thursday he had written Dr. Stewart asking for an immediate hearing.

Dr. Stewart said he had not yet received the letter, but would consider it when it arrived. "I'll have to feel out the views of other members of the board," he added.

"It's a case of following our own regulations, and even a special meeting would require roughly three weeks. He said he plans to phone board members today to check their feelings and any departure from the scheduled would have to be decided by the full board. But time is running out in the battle between the agency and the CBC and CTV television networks.

The Western Football Conference opens its regular season in Edmonton July 30, and the EFC schedule starts one week later in Toronto. So even if the seven-station network received immediate approval at a public hearing in three weeks time, the season would be well under way before the telecasts could start. And there would be no provision for Western Canada viewers.

The agency says it has letters supporting the independent network from tv stations in Toronto and Montreal and negotiations were continuing to extend the coverage to Ottawa and Quebec City.

Mr. Champagne said his agency could sell the complete EFC and WFC football package to either CBC or CTV, but could not sell to both as a sponsor then would be competing with his own advertising.
