Tid Bits From Here And There

United States ended Canada's domination of the world curling scene Thursday night when they defeated Canada 9-6 in a hair-raising final in the International Curling Championships at the Perth ice rink. Bud Sommerville skipped the winning foursome which upset the defending champion Canadian rink.

Rogers' Rangers with Norman 'Hawk' Larter at the helm, headed St. Dunstan's High School hockey team their first defeat of the season in Charlottetown and District junior hockey action at the Charlottetown Forum, Thursday night. The Rangers were faced with a 'do or die' situation as they were trailing the best-of-five series 2-0 going into Thursday's battle. Young Jamey Kennedy paved the way for the Rangers' victory. The fast moving centreman blasted three markers behind Saint's Carl McQuaid as he paced his team to their 5-4 overtime triumph over the Red and White forces. Kennedy fired the winner in the second overtime of the game. Next game in the series is scheduled for Sunday afternoon.

Jean Beliveau led the Montreal Canadiens to a 4-1 victory over the Toronto Maple Leafs in National Hockey League action Thursday night, with a two goal performance and Detroit Red Wings bombed Boston Bruins 10-3. Montreal will host Billy Reay's Chicago Black Hawks and New York Rangers will invade Maple Leaf Gardens to battle with 'Punch' Imlach's warriors in tonight's NHL action.

New Glasgow Rangers are expected to pick-up several players if they defeat Glace Bay Miners and advance to the eastern Allan-Cup quarter-finals. The Rangers expect to pick up four or five members of the Moncton Hawks; two members of Windsor-Dartmouth and possibly one member of Halifax Schooners. The Moncton players are: goaltender Don Larin, forwards Phil DeLora, Harley Estabrooks, George (Goose) Gosselin, and possibly defenceman Eustace Reeves. Windsor-Dartmouth players mentioned are: defenceman Cliff MacKay and forward Jim Beckman. The Halifax player is defenceman Lloyd (Toy Toy) Gallant of Summerside, Prince Edward Island.

Peter Snell, double Olympic gold medalist and holder of three world records, confirmed Thursday he would definitely retire after his European tour in June and July. He defeated Canada's Bill Crothers in the 800 metres in Tokyo.

Lloyd 'Bull' Hillier's Flyers topped Covehead 9-3 in Intermediate 'C' hockey action at North River rink, Thursday night. Don Wood paced the Flyers scoring attack with six goals while Sam Tibbo netched a brace and Bob Dalziel fired a singleton. For the losers, Gregory, Morrison and Malone dented the twines.

HUNTERS' CORNER

Geese Migration Late, Is Columnist's Report

The 17th of March, St. Patrick's Day, has come and gone and no wild geese worth the name have reached the Island. In the old days of spring shooting the 17th of March was the day when hunters repaired to St. Peter's Island or Tracadie Bay and officially opened the spring shooting season. The Lunds, and other Charlottetown hunters, would head for St. Peter's Island and the late Dr. Alvey and his buddies would favour Tracadie Bay. The Tracadie hunters always planned on a big 'card party' at the Gentleman's Club when the geese were played for. Some opening shoots were very successful. Some springs it required a wood sleigh with an extra board on the sides to transport their kill to Bedford Station.

In 1917 spring shooting was banned under the Migratory Birds Convention Act. On March 29th, 1929 I was sworn in as Federal Migratory Birds warden. On March 17th, one specific spring, I estimated between 17,000 and 18,000 geese at Tracadie Bay. Savage Harbour, Covehead Bay, Rustico, Pownal Bay, Orwell and Flat River were crowded with geese that spring. Prince, the black westerns Percheron, was kept busy. He was as light on foot as a cat and tough as nails.

When I look back on some of my patrols, it makes me feel weary just to think about them. I forked the saddle on Prince early one April morning at 7.45 in the yard of the Lennox Hotel, Souris, and headed for my home at Mount Allison 45 miles distant. The mud was felloch deep practically all the way, but I made journey's end as the sun was sinking in the west. The day before, I patrolled as far East as South Lake and two days after I arrived back from the east I rode Prince into the yard of the Orient Hotel, Victoria, and gave Prince County a look over. I have seen geese in the Dunk and Bradshaw rivers and off Nolan's Island that numbered in the thousands... acres upon acres of geese.

The hunt, later in the spring, were present in thousands and every creek, pond or flooded meadow held its quota of black ducks. One spring I had eleven conditions in the Bedoune — some made ones of Prince

County on spring shooters and at \$25 a throw, plus costs, that sure took the joy out of spring shooting. If the penalties for game law and migratory birds infractions get any lower poachers will soon be expecting a bonus instead of a fine. I suppose the "fine remitting" practice that was in vogue not long ago will be viewed in that light. What a hunter swears that shall he also reap and the reaping days are about over for the simple reason there'll be no crop to gather in.

The limiting of the take of young seals this spring to 30,000 was a commendable move by the department concerned. Some hunters would kill the last young seal and then keep the following spring because there was nothing left to hunt. Like the farmer's cat the year 3000 geese were purchased at \$4 per bird and turned loose for cat food at four smackers per plate. A farmer told me a bunch of 15 that made his farm buildings their home kept disappearing one per day until there was none left. He wasn't aware of the barn and found his cat weeping her eyes out beside a pile of quail feathers. She spent days at the same spot giving vent to a pitiful "meow" and with eyes watered with her tears. She was a gaunt pussy before she gave up her sit down strike. Once again this columnist wishes to commend the department concerned for their timely foresight with regard to the limit on the take on young seals.

Rangers Tie Red Wings; Ullman Scores Hat Trick

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York Rangers salvaged a 6-6 tie with Detroit Friday night on Jean Ratelle's goal after high scoring Norm Ullman sparked a third-period rally by the National Hockey League's leading Red Wings.

The deadlock increased Detroit's margin over second place Montreal to four points. The Red Wings have 81 points. The Canadiens have 77 and one more game to play than the Wings.

Ratelle pulled the Rangers even with 3 1/2 minutes remaining on his second goal of the night. The lanky New York center has scored 10 goals in his last 10 games.

The Red Wings had come from two goals down in the final period, as Ullman completed a hat trick with his 37th and 38th tallies of the season. Eddie Joyal's goal, sandwiched between Ullman's pair, tied the score 5-5.

with 5:24 gone in the period. Ullman's go-ahead goal, which tied him with Chicago's Bobby Hull for the NHL's goal-scoring lead, came at 9:14.

The Rangers, who failed to beat the Wings in seven meetings at New York, opened the scoring on Donnie Marshall's 19th goal of the season with less than four minutes gone in the game.

But Detroit's Ron Murphy and Gordie Howe scored before the period was over for a 2-1 edge. Murphy's goal was his 20th and gave the wings five 20-goal scorers. Ullman, Howe, Alex Delvecchio and Bruce MacGregor are the others.

Queen Charlotte High Trips Birchwood Team

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Alberta On Top In Curling Spiel

TORONTO (CP)—Ernie Boushey played some of the greatest shots, but his short draw attempt with last rock gave Saskatchewan a 10-9 victory and toppled Manitoba from the ranks of the undefeated in the national mixed curling championships Friday.

Boushey, whose Winnipeg rink trailed Saskatchewan's Grant Boney of Regina 8-2 after five ends in the eighth-round match, came through with a spectacular display to gain an 8-4 tie after eight.

But Saskatchewan collected two on the ninth and Boushey, who was counting number one when he came up to throw his last stone of the game, was four feet short of the house.

The loss left Alberta, skipped by Lee Green of Calgary, was the only undefeated rink after seven games in the 11-rink round-robin tournament.

Manitoba, which has already lost out a bye along with Alberta, had a 6-1 win-loss record after the eighth round and second-place tie with Ontario's Ray Grant of Unionville.

Northern Ontario, skipped by Wilf Biron of Sudbury, followed with four wins in seven starts. Rinks skipped by Brub Peterson of Fredericton and Charles Piper of Halifax and Newfoundland's Dave Pedley of St. John's all had 3-4 records.

Fred Tilling of Vancouver and Saskatchewan had three wins each in eight games, while Prince Edward Island's Gordon Spicer of Summerside had a lone victory in eight starts.

Oliver Samson of Quebec City had one win in seven tries. The Manitoba rink—except for Boushey—played its poorest game to date. Only deadly draw shooting by Boushey kept Manitoba in the game. He drew to the centre in succession, and stole three on the eighth by coming through a port with less than two inches to spare for a takeout.

Alberta took a 6-5 lead on the seventh end to break up a close battle with B.C. and go on to

British Columbia had taken a 4-2 lead in the fourth but Alberta battled back and, after collecting three on the seventh end to take a 6-4 lead, took command of the contest.

Ontario, after losing one on the opening end, blanked the second and took a pair on the third. Northern Ontario took two on the fourth but after Grant followed with two more he was never in trouble again.

RCAF Summerside Eagles Cap Tri Service Ch'ship

SUMMERSIDE — RCAF Summerside Eagles won their second championship within five days, defeating Shearwater Flyers 11-2 to win the three day, Tri-Service Hockey Tournament at the RCAF Station yesterday afternoon.

Last Saturday the Eagles claimed the Maritime Armed Forces Hockey League title by defeating Greenwood Bombers 4-2.

Prior to the final game, Shearwater and Summerside were two of 11 teams who remained unbeaten in the single knockout tourney. The Flyers wallopped RCHA (Army) 10-4 on Thursday and yesterday morning upset highly rated Black Watch (A) Battalion (Army) 8-0 before their afternoon game with Summerside.

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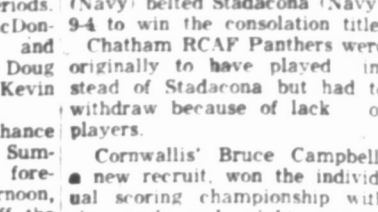
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
