

Dodgers Back On Top; Tigers Lead American League Clubs

Detroit and Brooklyn entrenched themselves more firmly at the top of their respective leagues Sunday by knocking off their chief competitors.

The Tigers nipped Chicago 3-2 in 11 innings and held the second place White Sox to an 0-0 deadlock in 10 innings of the second game of a double header to boost their first place American League margin from percentage points to a half game.

The Dodgers also captured a squeaker, edging out the Philadelphia Phillies 2-1 to take a half game lead over Cincinnati and a game and a half lead over the Phils. Cincinnati stayed close to the Dodgers, defeating St. Louis 6-5 after the Cards had captured the first game 10-7.

Cleveland missed a chance to move past the White Sox into the runner-up position when Bob Turley pitched a four-hitter to give the Baltimore Orioles a 2-1 triumph over the Indians in 10 innings. Gil Coan's 10th inning single with two out off Art Houtteman scored Neil Berry from third with the winning run.

The New York Yankees remained two games from the top by whipping the Philadelphia Athletics 7-4 in the first game of a double-header and coming from behind to tie the A's 1-1 in the called ninth-inning nightcap. As in Chicago, darkness halted the second contest.

MAGLIE GETS FIFTH
The New York Giants and Chicago Cubs climbed into the .500 class, the Giants crushing the Pittsburgh Pirates 5-1 and the Cubs vanquishing the Milwaukee Braves 5-3. Home runs by Hank Sauer and Ralph Kiner gave the Cubs' Bob Rush the victory over

Warren Spahn. Willie Mays' two-run triple helped Sal Maglie win his fifth game in six starts for the Giants.

The scheduled doubleheader between Washington and the Red Sox in Boston was postponed by rain. It marked the 11th of 20 Boston home games washed out by rain this season.

Steve Gromek, veteran Tiger righthander, went the distance in the 11-inning opener to register his fifth triumph without a defeat. He allowed nine hits to 11 by Sandy Consuegra and loser Virgil Trucks and was rewarded with the victory when Chicago's Cass Michaels made a bases-loaded error with two out in the 11th. Detroit's Billy Hoelt and Chicago's Billy Pierce waded the 10-inning scoreless nightcap.

Homers by Andy Carey, Yogi Berra and Enos Slaughter enabled the Yankees to inflict the first defeat of the season upon Bob Trice, Philadelphia's rookie righthander. Trice had won his first four starts. Bill Skowron's eighth inning single scored Mickey Mandle with the tying run in the second. Ex-Yankee Bill Renna had put Alex Keller and the A's in front with a fifth inning homer.

Brooklyn's Carl Erskine out-pitched Robin Roberts although he needed help from Jim Hughes in the eighth. Sandy Amoros' two-out double in the seventh and Billy Cox's single accounted for the two Dodger runs.

MUSIAL SCORES FOUR
Stan Musial drove in four runs with a home run and two singles to give St. Louis his third victory without a defeat for the Cardinals in the opener against the Reds. Ted Kluszewski walloped two homers in the nightcap, after hitting one in the first game, to

give Cincinnati the split.

In the American League Saturday, New Garver, who has given up three runs in 37 innings, hurled a seven-hitter as Detroit defeated Chicago 12-1. In the only other American League game, Cleveland Indians got all their runs in the fourth inning to defeat Baltimore 5-3. Mike Garcia was the winning pitcher although he had to be removed in the sixth when the Orioles scored their three runs.

In the National League, Stan Musial's three-run homer was the big blow in St. Louis' 7-3 victory over Cincinnati. Chet Nichols tossed an eight-hitter in Milwaukee's 3-2 win over Chicago. Johnny Antonelli hurled a five-hitter and Willie Mays slammed a homer as New York beat Pittsburgh 2-0. Reese, with a two-run homer and two other hits, led Brooklyn to a 3-0 victory over Philadelphia plying Johnny Podres his third pitching win.

Teepees Defeat Oil Kings 8-2 In Cup Series Opener

TORONTO (CP)—A smooth-working St. Catharines Teepees machine walloped Edmonton Oil Kings 8-2 here Sunday in the first game of the best-of-seven Memorial Cup hockey final.

Teepees, clicking on every turn after winning the eastern junior title Friday night, put on the pressure from the opening, and headed the Kings their worst defeat of the season before a 4,780 fans.

Jack Armstrong, a heavy front-liner, scored three times to pace St. Catharines' march toward a Memorial Cup in the first try since entering junior "A" hockey 12 years ago. Don McLean and Hughie Barlow, two of the heroes of the eastern final against Quebec Frontenacs, each counted twice and starry forward Brian Cullen tipped in the other.

Norm Ullman and Jerry McInyk, Edmonton's top scorers, fired the Oil King goals.

The two clubs meet in Maple Leaf Gardens Tuesday night in the second game of the junior series. Oil Kings looked little like the powerful club that racked up 51 wins against four losses in league and playoffs in the west. They dropped behind 5-1 in the second period.

The Oil Kings' defence told much of the story. Poor clearing around their own net set up at least four of the Teepees goals.

Islanders Appear Out Of Maritime Hockey League

HALIFAX, N. S., May 9 (CP)—It was indicated at the annual meeting of the Maritime Major Hockey League held in New Glasgow this afternoon that the League would play in Allan Cup competition next season.

All delegates spoke of the desirability of a return to the status of Allan Cup hockey assuring the League winner an opportunity to advance along the Canadian Trophy trail.

For the past two seasons the M.M.H.L. winner automatically won the Alexander Trophy, emblematic of Canadian Major Series supremacy. Two years ago the Quebec League winners, getting ready to turn professional, refused to meet Halifax. Last year the M.M.H.L. was the only Major Series League in Canada.

Dartmouth and New Glasgow represented at the meeting made it clear they were interested only if the League returned to Allan Cup hockey.

No action will be taken until the next meeting to be held June 20 at New Glasgow. It is expected that the delegates will vote at that time to disband the M.M.H.L. and form a new league.

No matter what happens it is not likely that Charlottetown Islanders will be in the League.

Sydney said because of high travelling expenses they could not again enter a league with Charlottetown. They had nothing against the Islanders who had been a good gate attraction, but they could not make the long trip to Charlottetown and hope to finish with anything other than an adverse bank account. Glace Bay Miners were of the same opinion.

Secretary-Registrar Chris McAlden, who spoke for a group of Dartmouth spokesmen said he had been instructed to say that Dartmouth were not interested in Charlottetown were in the league.

McAlden also spoke for Halifax who did not send a delegate to the meeting. The feeling in Halifax was that it would be better to play Allan Cup hockey. Moreover Halifax officials believed the league should be restricted to clubs within the Province to reduce travelling expenses.

The Islanders were represented at the meeting by President Smith MacFarlane.

The trials are being held in order to determine Canada's representative at the British Empire Games in Vancouver this summer. They open on Thursday and run through until Saturday.

MacDonald will leave here by plane on Wednesday morning and will fight in the flyweight division on Thursday night. One of his toughest opponents is expected to be Bob Crews of Toronto.

The City boxer is being sent to the trials by the Abegweit Club and the Physical Fitness Department. Stevie has been training for several weeks. He began training in preparation for the annual Maritime boxing tournament but has decided to shoot for Dominion honors.

MacDonald won Maritime fame during the past several years for his accomplishments in the amateur tournaments at Halifax. Two years ago he won the flyweight title by acclamation and then jumped into the bantamweight division to whip all contenders in the 112-118 pound class.

MacDonald is both a clever boxer and a solid puncher. A number of his victories in the Maritime amateur tournaments have been by the knockout route. On one occasion he disposed of his opponent in the opening round.

Parry O'Brien Cracks 60-Foot Shot Put Mark

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Giant Parry O'Brien of Los Angeles made a shambles of the supposedly unpenetrable 60-foot mark in the shotput Saturday when he twice officially surpassed the distance and wound up a record-shattering day with an amazing put of 60 feet 5½ inches.

The 22-year-old holder of the world record, with a performance that astounded several thousand track and field fans gathered for the UCLA-USC dual Pacific Coast Conference meet, actually broke his own world record three times before concluding the series.

The 1932 Olympic champion signalled what was to come when he tossed the 16-pound iron ball unofficially 60 feet, 4 inches in his first warmup while he was still wearing his sweat suit, complete with pants and jacket.

O'Brien, 220-pound former University of Southern California athlete, last year set the official world record of 59 feet 2¼ inches. Two weeks ago he bettered the mark in an exhibition at the Drake relays, registering 59 feet 9¼ inches. Application for acceptance of the mark was in the works until he went on his rampage Saturday.
