New Law Said Reason For Fewer Accidents

Fewer uninsured drivers and a substantial reduction in the number of car accidents on Prince Edward Island highways are two major benefits apparent from the first four months operation of the province's new financial responsibility law.

An examination of accident reports submitted for the first four months of 1962 indicates the total number of accidents has been reduced by 269 from last year's figure of 900. Of the drivers involved in accidents during that period, only 92 did not carry automobile insurance. In the same four month period in 1961, there were 665 uninsured drivers involved in accidents.

In assessing the figures, the registrar of motor vehicles, A. J. Gallant, said the obvious reduction in the number of accidents, and the apparent success of drivers in obtaining proper insurance protection, have established the financial responsibility law as a most important asset to P.E.I. drivers and visitors alike.

The law requires that a driver involved in an accident be able to produce proof of financial responsibility, or insurance coverage to \$25,000 or else face suspension of driving privileges. The law is designed to protect the innocent victim from financial loss as the result of an accident.

"The success is obvious from these figures," Mr. Gallant said. "We have a very high proportion of our drivers insured now and we have been able to do this through the co-operation of Island insurance underwriters. For new drivers and those with a poor driving record, we have been able to provide insurance through our assigned risk plan."

Former Ploughing Champion Is Appointed to Farm Staff

Dr. Carl Willis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Willis of Cornwall, has returned to his native province as a research officer at the Experimental Farm. He will be attached to the plant pathology section in which he will undertake investigations of plant diseases affecting the major crops of Prince Edward Island.

After graduating from Prince of Wales College, Dr. Willis entered the plant pathology option at Macdonald College of McGill University where he obtained his B.Sc. degree. This was followed by post-graduate work at the University of Wisconsin where he majored in the virus disease of plants. His Ph.D. degree was awarded in 1958 in the spring of this year.

Dr. Willis is no stranger to agricultural life and problems on Prince Edward Island and he early became a rival of his father who won the Queens County ploughing match four years in succession. Accused Changes Not Guilty Plea, Is Remanded To July 11
