Advice to Dyspeptics.

THE PHILOSOPHY OF EATING—THE USE AND ABUSE OF FOOD.

A prominent physician, writing to Chambers' Journal, gives some practical thoughts on the subject of indigestible food, and rules for eating, which strike the real cause of more than one-half of stomachic troubles. He says: "Every individual can without inconvenience carry a certain weight, while any addition to it is accompanied by a proportionate sense of oppression. In the same way, what is called indigestion is often simply a result of excess. The amount of food which each man is capable of digesting with ease has always a limit. The limit bears relation to his age, constitution, state of health and habits. One point to bear in mind is, that not to eat a sufficiency at one meal makes you too hungry for the next; and that when your too hungry you are apt to overload the stomach and give the gastric juices more to do than they have the power to perform.

"To eat too often and to eat irregularly is another source of indigestion; and still another very fruitful source of dyspepsia is imperfect mastication. We believe one reason why dinner-parties are not so dangerous—digestively speaking—as they ought to be, is, that people are compelled, through courtesy, to consume their food slowly and in small quantities each mouthful; thus the quantity consumed is counteracted by the long time used in consumption, which does less violence to the stomach than one plateful of meat flung down unmasticated.

"There are several symptoms of dyspepsia. One is what is known as the 'fidgets,' a restless state of body, which comes on frequently after dinner, from which there is no relief except by going entirely to rest; and even then it pursues the victim. Another queer symptom is the fancied unnatural size of the limbs or hand. Many can testify to this experience, fancying their hand or leg has grown to a colossal size. All indigestion, this. Who would have thought it!"

An important meeting of representative men was held in London, at which the Lord Mayor presided. Resolutions were unanimously adopted calling upon the Government to rescind Sir Charles Warren's recall from South Africa, and urging the annexation of Zululand by Great Britain.

The Humane society has presented a medal to a captain belonging to a Leinster regiment for saving the lives of seven of the Nile voyagers during the recent campaign in Egypt.

The annual statement of the Northern Pacific for the year ending June 30th, shows gross receipts of \$11,234,150; operating expenses, \$6,192,301; net earnings, \$5,037,849.

The official enquiry into Sunday labor in Germany has been nearly completed. It is expected the report will advise against any alteration in the present law.

The Lord Mayor of London has forwarded the first instalment—£1,500—of the fund he recently started for the relief of the cholera sufferers in Spain.

A demonstration was made on Wednesday at Marseilles against the employment of Italian workmen, when the police were obliged to interfere.

It is reported that Bismarck has informed the Bundesrath that he has no fears that the differences with Spain will result in hostilities.

The Telegraph conference will re-assemble in Paris in 1890. The new tariffs will go into effect July, 1886.

The report that the German Government was making increased naval preparations is semi-officially denied.

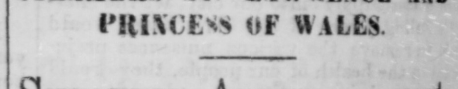

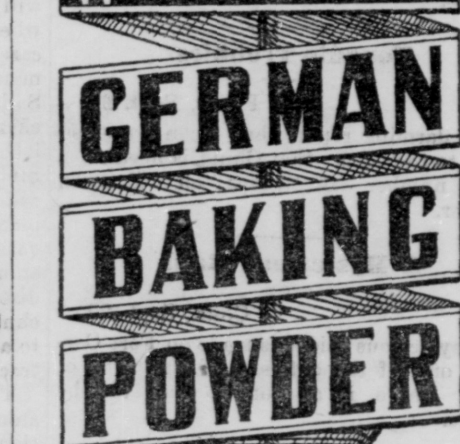
