Montague United Church Observes Anniversary

Very large congregations attended both services in Trinity United Church, Montague, on Sunday, August 23rd, when the church observed the 77th anniversary of the dedication of the present church for the worship of God, and the 28th anniversary of the United Church of Canada, and recalled the goodly heritage from the past brought to this area by true and worthy Presbyterian, Methodist and Bible Christian pioneers, exemplified respectively by Dr. James MacGregor, Rev. James Bulpitt, Rev. Francis Metherall and a host of others.

The minister, Rev. J. Murdoch Fraser, conducted both services, with the large church choir leading the service of praise.

In the morning, Mrs. John MacRae and Mrs. W. J. Mutch of Cherry Valley sang the duet "The Beautiful City" and Mrs. MacRae sang the solo "Bless This Church."

The guest preacher, Rev. J. Allison Fraser, brother of the minister, Saint John, N.B., spoke on "The Church in the Wilderness" from the words of Stephen, the first Christian martyr (Acts 7:38). He quoted Dr. A. J. Gossip, "The church is a little clearing in the choked jungle of life," noting the witness of the church as follows:

1. In mission lands, as Dr. Sidney Gilchrist, in Africa combating pagan practices as "the dance of death"; 2. In war-torn lands as Korea; 3. In American industrial life; 4. In Canada, amid tremendous new development, e.g. Klumath, B.C., changing from an Indian village of seventy people to an expected fifty thousand; 5. In the local area.

Rev. A. S. Weir of Cornwall brought greetings and pronounced the benediction.

At the evening service, Rev. Harry J. Vickerson, a native son of this church, led in anniversary prayer, and gave the benediction.

A duet, "Love Divine, All Loves Excelling" was sung by Mrs. Douglas Coffin and Mrs. Arnold Wightman. The Brooklyn trio, Messrs. Johnnie Bears, Malcolm Munro and Willard Bruce sang the selections "Lead Me Gently Home" and "Majestic Sweetness."

The pastor narrated several "milestones" in the church heritage in this area from 1783 to the present day, noting the latest milestone, the building of the church hall during the ministry here of Dr. A. D. MacKenzie. He referred to the very comprehensive historical account compiled from various sources for this anniversary by Rev. H. J. Vickerson.

Rev. Allison Fraser preached on Revelation 21:13, "On the east three gates; on the north three gates; on the south three gates; and on the west three gates."

He said that many different roads lead to the city of God, and all people did not have to pass through the same experience, nor have the same mode of conversion. The very hearty singing by choir and congregation of such great psalms as "All People That On Earth Do Dwell," "Sing To The Lord With Cheerful Voice," and such hymns as "Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah" was an impressive feature of these services.

The ministers, the guest singers and choir were entertained after the evening service in MacKenzie Hall by the ladies of the church in a friendly hour, with music and refreshments.
