Five Islanders Returning In 2nd Contingent

OTTAWA.—The second contingent of Canadian soldiers returning from service with the 1st Canadian Infantry Brigade in Germany will arrive at Quebec City on Tuesday, October 25, it was announced at Army Headquarters today. Many of them will be accompanied by dependents.

The draft, comprising 24 officers, 518 men, 108 wives and 171 children, will arrive aboard the RMS Samaria.

FIVE ISLANDERS

The following Islanders, all members of the 2nd Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, are in the draft: Pte. F. J. Gallant, Fredericton Station, Pte. J.A.G. Gallant, Tignish, both stopping over in Montreal, Pte. G. J. Jones, Elmsdale R.R.I., Pte. C. F. McCormick, O'Leary, and Pte. R. J. Meston, 200 Sydney St., Charlottetown.

Largest group in the draft are from the 2nd Battalion Royal 22e Regiment and the 2nd Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry. Also aboard are officers and men of the Royal Canadian Engineers, Royal Canadian Army Service Corps, Royal Canadian Electrical and Mechanical Engineers and HQ 1st Canadian Infantry Brigade.

In all eleven sailings will be required to bring back to Canada more than 8,000 soldiers and dependents. The rotation of the 1st and 2nd Brigades will go until early December, transporting more than 15,000 troops and dependents between Canada and Europe.

The Prince Edward Island Advisory Board to the Canadian National Institute for the Blind has launched its annual appeal for funds and preliminary reports are encouraging. Mr. T. D. DeBlou, Provincial Campaign Chairman said today.

The drive will last two weeks with a minimum objective of \$7400. The work of C.N.I.B. Prince Edward Island office fills an important place in community life. One hundred and seventy blind persons are registered at the Prince Edward Island office in Charlottetown which provides employment, recreational, public teaching and many other facilities for its clients.

"Because of the importance of the C.N.I.B. in the lives of those of our fellow citizens who live in darkness I feel sure that every citizen will be interested in doing all possible with regard to current campaign," Mr. DeBlou said.

"And additional encouragement for your support is the noteworthy fact that many of the staff of this organization, including the national managing director and founder Col. E. A. Baker, are themselves blind, and yet a major activity of the Institute is its prevention of blindness program."

Scotsmen Read Of Salmon Fishing In Northern B. C.

The abundance of game attracted to a salmon run in northern British Columbia, as described in a 1921 magazine article recently printed, would make any hunter trigger-happy.

"The salmon were running and the birds of the air and the beasts of the field were called to a royal feast," wrote James G. Sinclair, father of the present federal fisheries minister.

The article, published originally in Edinburgh, Scotland, was reprinted in a monthly publication of the fisheries department with a note setting its description of a northern B.C. stream when salmon complete their spawning is as accurate today as it was in 1921.
