DEDICATION AND CHURCH ORGANIZATION

A beautiful new house of worship has been built by the Hazelbrook section of the Alexandria Baptist church. The main audience room is capable of seating 200, and with the school-room which has folding doors connection, it can be easily enlarged to seat 300.

The services of dedication were conducted last Sunday. The preachers were Rev. D. Price of Tryon, E. G. Turner (Methodist) of Pownall and G. W. Corey of Charlottetown. Rev. W. H. Warren assisted at each of the services.

Monday evening Pastor Warren preached an impressive sermon on "Be not faithless, but believe." An evangelist's services followed in which a large number participated. Several were moved to prayer.

Tuesday the Council called to consider the propriety of organizing a church at Hazelbrook, commenced at 2:30 p. m. Those interested in building the new edifice had been members of the Alexandria church. The Council after weighing the reasons presented for a separate organization approved the purpose of the trustees.

A church of thirty-five members was then organized; officers were then chosen by the new church as follows: Rev. J. C. Spurr, pastor; J. B. Jones, Leighton McCaig, R. Jenkins, deacons and Robert Jones, honorary deacon; Clerk, Samuel Sully; Treasurer, Miss Susan Jones; Finance Committee, Henry Jones, Wm. Jones and Daniel Jenkins.

The recognition service was conducted in the evening. Telling addresses were made on various features of the church. Pastors Price, Whitman, McPhee and Warren speaking respectively on its officers, work, ordinances and discipline. Pastor Higgins extended the hand of fellowship on behalf of the sister churches and pastor Corey gave the charge to the church.

The deacons were publicly recognized and set apart to their office by the pastor, who extended the hand of fellowship to them.

The music of the services did not go unnoted. With a new organ under the excellent leadership of Miss Lydia Jones, the choir added much to the interest and profit of the meetings. The moderator, Pastor Warren, voiced the feelings of the people in a few well-chosen words of approval.

When it is further learned that the P. E. Island Baptist Conference held its annual session on Tuesday morning, it will be seen that Sunday, Monday and Tuesday were three full days. This being the annual meeting, the Conference appointed Pastor Higgins chairman, and Pastor Price secretary. Attention was directed chiefly to home mission grants and the work of the general mission society. The next session will be held at Tryon in March.
