

Giants' Victory Fires New Hope In Long-Shot N.L. Pennant Chances

NEW YORK, Sept. 24—(AP)—The relentless New York Giants slashed idle Brooklyn's lead to 2 1/2 games today with a 4-3 victory over Boston that fired new hope in their long-shot pennant chances.

Brooklyn still needed any combination of four wins or New York defeats to clinch the National League championship. Both the Dodgers and Giants finish up on the road.

The Dodgers, enjoying an off day before a two-night double-header in Boston, had seven to play, the Giants only four. After four in Boston, Brooklyn winds up with three in Philadelphia. The Giants play at Philadelphia tomorrow and Wednesday and finish at Boston Saturday and Sunday.

Stanky, whose error opened the door for a two-run Boston rally in the fourth, struck the winning blow with a ninth-inning single.

Tied 3-3 going to the last of the ninth with young Chet Nichols blazing an eight-strike-out game. Don Mueller opened with a single. Manager Leo Durocher sent in Dave Williams to run for Mueller.

Billy Nigey batting for Westrum, moved Williams to second with an effective sacri-

fice bunt. Ray Noble popped out as a pinch hitter for the second out.

The New York Yankees have long been labelled a team of destiny in the major league circles and from the records it would appear that the label has been rightfully applied. If such a title were to be handed out in Provincial baseball circles it possibly could go to the Summerside Intermediates for their record in winning baseball championships since the war years has been as good as Notre Dame football teams. This year they faced the greatest challenge to their island supremacy that they met for some time and regardless of whether they win or not they have shown that they can come through when it counts most.

Behind two games to nothing in the present series the Summerside entry in most baseball circles was given little chance to win their fifth successive Island crown. In the first game the Abbies pounced on Joe Bernard for a 5-2 win. In the second game the Abbies came from behind in the last half of the ninth inning to win 3-2. The law of averages dictated that Charlottetown should lose one game and that they did at Summerside by the score of 7-4. In the fourth game the Abbies went into a commanding 7-2 lead but there the wheel stopped and the fortunes turned the other way.

It's history now but Summerside came back to earn a 7-7 draw. They came into Charlottetown Sunday and decisively beat the local boys 5-2. What promised to be a four game series has now gone five without a winner being declared. The sixth and final game of this series will be played on Wednesday with the locally being decided by representatives of the two teams and Brigadier Bill Reid of the Physical Fitness Department.

Without discrediting the efforts of the Summerside team or aiming for the Abbies, it is possibly quite safe to say that the Abbies would now be Provincial champions had their pitching staff not met with such tough luck. Lefty MacAleer, after limiting the Summerside team to two runs in winning the opener, has left the Province as a crew member on the ice-breaker Saurel. Charlie Ryan, who gave up only six hits in winning the second game, has come down with torn tendons in his pitching elbow and is through hurling for the season. "Spy" Ready has had a sore arm all season and "Red" MacKenzie has been afflicted with a similar injury lately. With Lefty MacAleer on the mound or a strong armed Charlie Ryan in top shape it is very doubtful if Summerside would have scored five runs to earn a draw in the fourth game.

Coach Freddy Whelan's main worry before Sunday's game concerned pitching and it turned out to be the least of his troubles. Donnie MacLean turned in one of his finest performances this season in limiting Holman's to six hits and two earned runs. He deserved a better fate than that on the losing end of a 5-2 score but Alan Stewart on the hill for Summerside proved to be a tough man to hit Sunday and his four hit victory was well deserved.

With hockey training scheduled to start around the last of the week, hockey players like college students at the opening of a semester, begin returning. Larry Travis and Boy Gray motored down from Winnipeg in Gray's car and Marcel Clements has arrived from his Sudbury, Ont. home. Travis and Gray spent the summer working together for the C. N.R. in Winnipeg and local fans will hope that they spend the winter working together here. Clements worked in a Sudbury nickel mine for the summer and spent a lot of his free time playing golf.

The first ice will probably be laid on the Charlottetown Forum tonight. Forum Manager Bill Brown has the sand laid over the pipes and may have it frozen hard enough to pour water on it this evening. If all goes well the players may be skating by Friday or Saturday. Already Bill has received a flock of calls about the first open skate which will not be taking place until well on in October.

A. L. Arranges Playoff Plan

CHICAGO, Sept. 24—(AP)—Although it doesn't seem New York Yankees will be caught, the American League today arranged a playoff program in the event Cleveland Indians or Boston Red Sox should squeeze into a pennant tie.

Now trailing by 2 1/2 games with only three games left, second-place Cleveland did the best in the coin-tossing ceremony in the office of League President Will Harridge.

If Cleveland ties with either New York or Boston in a two-club deadlock, either opponent would have to come to Cleveland for an Oct. 1 single playoff game.

If Boston somehow should erase its five-game lag and tie New York, that playoff would be held at Boston, also Oct. 1.

In the coin-flipping to determine order of play in event of a three-club tie, Cleveland drew a bye which left New York and Boston to face in a first playoff at New York Oct. 1. The winner then would be host to Cleveland the following day.

The World Series is scheduled to start Wednesday, Oct. 3 in the American League city if New York or Boston wins and Thursday, Oct. 4, if Cleveland wins.

Officials said this was the sixth time in the last eight years that the American League has had to gear for a snarled finish.

In 1944, St. Louis and Detroit went neck-and-neck to the wire, but the Browns won. The following year, Detroit won the pennant on the final day in a battle with Washington.

Boston and New York scrapped to the final day of the 1949 season before the Yankees copped the flag. Last year, New York, Boston and Detroit were embroiled in the stretch drive, the Yanks again nosing in front.

Casey Stengel Appears Near Greatest Triumph

NEW YORK, Sept. 24—(AP)—Casey Stengel was close to his third straight pennant today with only one .300 hitter and without a man on his New York Yankee club that has 100 runs batted in.

Actually the Yanks were nearer to the clinching than Brooklyn, practically conceded the National League flag in mid-summer. New York Giants continue to give the Dodgers fits down the stretch while the Yank opposition falters.

Needing only three more wins or Cleveland defeats to nail it down, Stengel today rested his Yanks for the final six games.

Bob Kuzava (11-6), used only in relief since Aug. 9, was named to face Philadelphia's Bobby Shantz (17-9) in a battle of lefthanders tomorrow. Stengel hesitated to take Kuzava out of the bullpen for he has been his most effective fireman. He's 1-0 against the A's since he was traded to New York by Washington June 15.

The Yanks expect trouble from Shantz, a five-foot-seven inch techie who has beaten them three times.

Cleveland, with only three games to play, faces Chicago in a night game at Comiskey Park tomorrow with Early Wynn (20-12) to face lefty Billy Pierce (14-14). Boston, five games behind and practically eliminated, plays a night game at Washington tomorrow.

Idle Brooklyn lined up Glem Ladhine (4-1) and Carl Erskine (16-10) to face the Braves tomorrow night in a doubleheader at Boston.

Braves will use Warren Spahn (21-13) and Jim Wilson (6-6) or Dave Cole (2-4).

The Giants will pitch Jim Hearn (15-9) against Robin Roberts (21-12) at Philadelphia.

If the Yanks go on to win, this probably will be recognized as Stengel's greatest triumph. For this has been a skillful job of piecing together a club that never was "set" all season.

Saddler And Pep Ready For Wednesday Bout

NEW YORK, Sept. 24—(AP)—Featherweight champion Sandy Saddler and challenger Willie Pep wound up training today for Wednesday's fourth edition of their title series at the Polo Grounds.

Saddler, winner in two of three previous meetings, remained a 2 to 1 favorite to do it again in this 15-rounder.

Pep prepared to leave his Hartford, Conn., home for New York tonight after his final four-round drill.

The 25-year-old champion, four years younger than the challenger, also boxed four rounds at his Summit, N. J. camp. He will do road work tomorrow, breaking camp Wednesday morning.

Overshadowed by the Sugar Ray Robinson-Randy Turpin fight two weeks ago, the contest has not generated as much excitement as their earlier scraps. It may catch on in the final days.

A gate of between \$75,000 and \$100,000 is expected by the International Boxing Club which has a profitable movie and theatre television deal on the side. The movies will bring \$100,000 and the theatre TV rights from 17 theatres in 13 cities outside of New York represent \$10,000.

If Pep overcomes the odds and wins back the title, he will become the first boxer ever to hold the same championship three times. Willie, a master boxer, held the crown from 1944 to Oct. 29, 1948 when Saddler knocked him out in the fourth round to score a tremendous upset.

Pep outboxed Saddler to win it back, Feb. 11, 1949. They didn't get together again until last September when Saddler dethroned Pep on a tko in the eighth.

Richard Signs Contract With Canadiens Club

MONTREAL, Sept. 24—(CP)—Maurice Richard the Rocket—walked into the offices of General Manager Frank Selke today and signed his 1951-52 contract with Montreal Canadiens of the National Hockey League.

No announcement was made of the terms but it is believed the starry right-winger, who was 30 years old last month, received a bonus arrangement similar to that of last season. Then he got \$100 a goal after 35. He wound up the season with 42 goals and 24 assists for 66 scoring points.

This is Richard's ninth season in the N.H.L., all of them with Canadiens. He needs only 31 goals to tie the all-time N.H.L. scoring record of 323 set by Nels Stewart of the old Montreal Maroons. Richard has 292 goals in eight seasons.

The Rocket also needs 69 points to tie the all-time point-total record of 548 set by Bill Cowley of Boston Bruins in regular-season play and only 50 points to equal Cowley's mark of 594 for regular season and playoffs.

Selke also announced the signing of Georges Bouchard—no relation to Canadiens' Butch Bouchard—formerly of the University of Montreal, and Bob Bonny, a Montreal boy who played last year as a forward with Sydney Millionaire in the Maritimes. Both players will be turned over to Lester Patrick's Victoria team of the Pacific Coast League, coached by Roger Leger, a former Canadian defenceman.
