CHICAGO (AP)—Bobby Hull scored his 52nd goal of the season Sunday night and sent Chicago Black Hawks winging to a 5-1 National Hockey League victory over Toronto Maple Leafs.

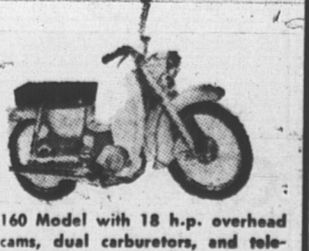
Sherwood Beats Souris Team

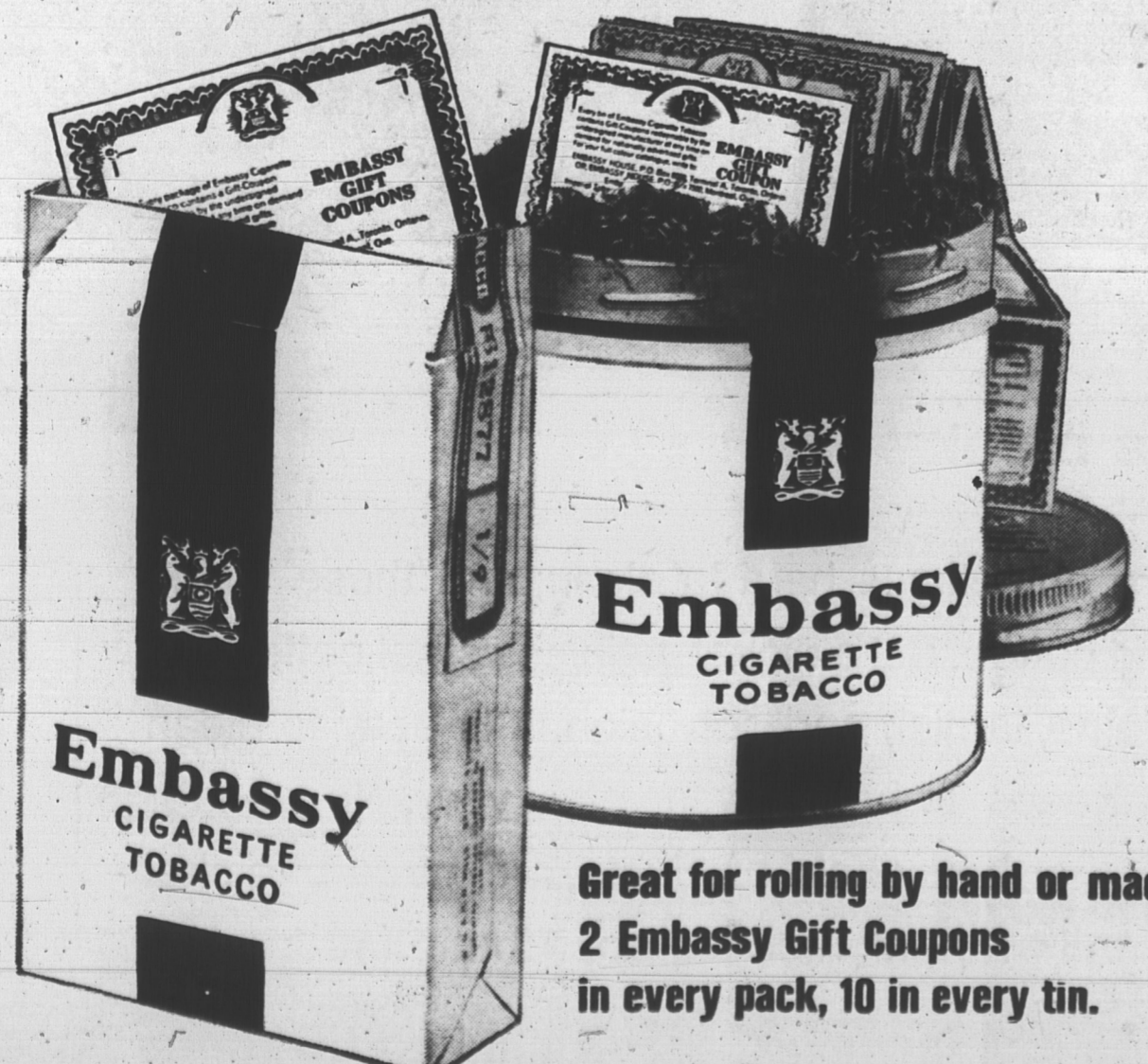
