WITHIN WHISKER OF LOSING LIFE

Larry Jeffrey Recalls Ordeal On Lake Huron

DETROIT (CP)—Larry Jeffrey, one of Detroit Red Wings' brightest young prospects, classes himself as the happiest player in this year's Stanley Cup final.

Jeffrey is happy to be alive. Not even the Wings know how close they came to losing the 22-year-old native of Godrich, Ont., one night last week. The NHL's only topnotch skipper came to within a whisker of losing his life then in the dark waters of Lake Huron.

"Even the guys on the team don't know about it," said Jeffrey in an interview Monday. He was sitting in Detroit Olympia, watching Toronto Maple Leafs work their way in preparation for the fourth game of the Stanley Cup final scheduled for here tonight.

The former Hamilton Red Wings junior, now in his second year as a professional, was hesitant to discuss the ordeal.

"My mother asked me why I had only a 20-second season," he smiled.

OWNS TUGBOATS

Jeffrey is a partner in a tugboat service called Godrich, which conducts two tugboats and three yachts on Lake Huron, and has two of its three tugboats and one of its two yachts as icebreakers in the winter.

His ordeal, a well-kept secret until now, started as a harmless evening of water skiing with another youth and a girl. They borrowed a 15-foot outboard. One mile from shore and in 27 feet of water, the boat capsized when hit by the backwash of a wave off a breakwall.

Windsor Bulldogs Sidelined

WINDSOR, Ont. (CP)—Windsor Bulldogs, after 10 years of thriving, finally made it to the Allan Cup finals when they defeated the Quebec Bulldogs Monday night.

The victory gave Windsor the best-of-seven Eastern Canada senior hockey series 4-1. Windsor won four straight games Monday to bench slugger Harmon Killebrew until his ailing right knee was in strag again.

Killebrew, battling only 105 pounds, lost his first game, was hobbled in a spring training by a twisted knee suffered when he fell during a turn. His loose dirt at Orlando, Fla. Field was drained from the knee once in Florida.
