

Car-Truck Crash Hospitalizes Six

Six persons were taken to the Charlottetown Hospital early last evening as the result of a highway accident at Orwell Cove.

The accident is said to have occurred when a pick-up truck driven by Jacob Visser, Orwell Cove, entered the main Trans-Canada Highway and was in collision with a car said to have been driven by John Noonan, Albany.

Those in hospital include Raymond and Emmett MacDonald, 24-year-old twins, and a younger brother, Chlorea MacDonnell, 23, and Joseph Dalton, 20, all from Picton, N.S., and James Hughes, 18, Northport, and John Noonan, 21, Albany.

They were passengers in the Noonan car and were said to be on the way to pick potatoes in the Albany area.

The car is said to have left the highway after the collision and to have careened down an embankment in front of a house.

The truck was leaving the yard of a nearby store when the accident occurred.

Conditions of the injured were unavailable last night but several broken limbs and a head injury are reported to have been suffered.

They were transported to hospital in ambulances from Jenkins, Gillis and Cutcliffe Funeral Homes.

RMP at Montague and Charlottetown were called to the scene.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — If a playoff is necessary to determine the winner of the National Baseball League pennant, Los Angeles Dodgers and San Francisco Giants will clash in a best-two-of-three series, league president Warren Giles announced Thursday.

Giles, now in Los Angeles, outlined this playoff schedule if the teams finish the regular season in a dead heat:

"The first game will be played at Candlestick Park in San Francisco Monday, Oct. 1, the second, and if necessary, the third games will be played at Dodger Stadium Oct. 23. The games will start at 1 p.m. PDT (4 p.m. EDT) and regular season prices will be maintained."

Lavarante Takes Turn For Worse

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Stricken Argentine heavyweight Alejandro Lavarante, unconscious since he was knocked out in a fight Friday night, took a turn for the worse Thursday.

A spokesman for California hospital said Lavarante is fast approaching the critical point.

A brief announcement from the hospital said: "Lavarante has regressed, apparently from damage to the stem of the brain." There was no immediate elaboration.

Lavarante, 25, six-foot-four, 212-pounder, has been in a coma six days. During that time, he has undergone four operations, two to relieve pressure on his brain.

His mother, Mrs. Lida Lavarante, and his brother, Jose, 21, are at his bedside.

The knockout Friday night was at the hands of unheralded Johnny Riggins of San Francisco, and came in the sixth round.

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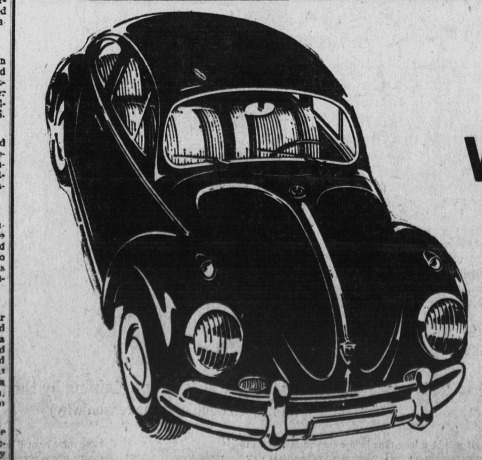
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Bombers Avenge Als Win
