EDUCATION AND RELIGION

It seems a platitude to say that a nation's most precious asset is its young people, and yet it is often overlooked.

In a recent address, president Sidney Smith said: "The work of a significant report was issued entitled: 'The Development of Moral and Spiritual Attitudes in the Public Schools of Saskatchewan.'"

Under the aegis of the Government's department a group had been studying their subject and one of their objects was to determine to what extent the present regulations in Saskatchewan are adequate to allow teachers and others to use school time to develop desirable moral and spiritual attitudes which are so necessary in producing good citizens."

They say that "moral attitudes pertain to action with reference to right and wrong in the sphere of human conduct" and that "spiritual attitudes take effect mainly in terms of inner emotions and sentiments. They have to do with the inner life of the individual and give warmth and drive to reasoned moral conviction and efficient social action."

These attitudes arise from many sources, not the least of which are sincere religious experiences and "faith." Then, after reviewing what the provinces are providing for in this field, they state their feeling that while "the responsibility for instruction designed to secure the acceptance of a religious faith should be left to the home and the church, the public school with its unifying influence is peculiarly fitted to contribute to the development of a high standard in moral and spiritual attitudes."

While their public schools must be non-denominational they have a highly significant part to play in "creating a climate friendly to religion."

Lenten Meditation

SPIRITUAL LOYALTIES

To an age obsessed by materialistic values the Ascension stands for the triumph of spiritual loyalties. To a world drifting into despair and cynicism it proclaims the sovereignty of Christ and the invincibility of God's Kingdom.

To say that Christ ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of God is to claim for him the lordship of all life, and finally in the moral universe.

Such a claim is admittedly uncongenial in the prevailing climate of opinion. Current ideas of historical relativity make it hard for contemporary minds to believe that any event in past history can itself reveal the truth of all history.

The whole idea of a "final" revelation embodied in one historical personality who lived at a given point of time, and that nearly 2,000 years ago, cuts right across the grain of the modern world view. There are no finalities in an evolving universe.

Nevertheless, this is the Christian faith. Ascension Day declares that Jesus of Nazareth has the final word in the destiny of man—his is the name which is above every name. Just what happened at the mount called Olivet it is not profitable to inquire. Speculations of that kind tend to miss the point.

The story is clothed in the language of symbolism. It is no valid objection to the symbolism to say that the disciples were pre-Copernican and thought in terms of a "three-storied universe."

Whatever their astronomical opinions were—and did they, for that matter, take the story literally?—that does not affect the insights of faith. Now at last they knew who their Master was. Now the decisive conviction took possession of them, and they saw that in him was revealed to man no less than the true and living God. Here is the purpose and meaning of life itself. There followed the total commitment of their loyalties.

If, as men are beginning to take for granted, no moral principles are absolute, then all ethics are frankly opportunistic. Social utility is the only criterion; and this leads straight to the conflicts of power.

At this time of confusion and cross purposes there is no need greater than the recognition of an unconditional standard of obligation, to which all human ambitions must be answerable and by which all men and nations are judged. Such the Church holds before mankind in the sovereignty of the exalted Christ.

The exaltation of Christ "into heaven" does not mean that he is withdrawn from history and is no longer relevant to the present age. It means, indeed, the exact opposite. What is affirmed is his liberation from the local limitations of space-time, so that he is the universal saviour and to every age the contemporary Christ.
