A GOOD MOVEMENT.

The main object of those who promote the Boy's Brigade is the moral and spiritual improvement of our boys. The Rev. Mr. Withycombe and those who have followed his initiative in this Province, deserve commendation and encouragement. We hope to see the Boy's Brigade movement grow and flourish because it leads on to a high standard of Christian manhood.

But there is another point of view from which the Boy's Brigade movement is to be regarded—that of the defence of our country. The Boer war has proved the superiority of an intelligent citizen-soldier trained to obey the word of command and yet to act, at times, upon personal initiative. The training of the Boys Brigade is calculated to produce just the class of soldiers that may be needed for the future defence of this country.

This movement is in the strictest sense a pious and patriotic one, and we are glad to note that such men as the Rector of St. Paul's, Colonel Moore, Mr. Watts and Mr. Miller are taking an active part in it, and that it is receiving the countenance and support of the community. The brigade is intensely interesting in itself. Indeed we know of nothing more interesting than our boys—unless it may be our girls; and we are pleased and proud to know that excellent conduct prevails in all its ranks, and that altogether it presents a fine appearance.

ought to Apologise!

We see no difference—and we believe the French-Canadians of Rustico will see no difference—between The Examiner's interpretation of the Guardian's language and the language as subsequently explained by the Guardian. Certainly, abuse of Pineau would never move the French-Conservatives of Rustico to vote for Dr. Douglas unless they sympathized with Pineau! In point of fact, the alleged "abuse" of Pineau by the Conservative Press, consisted in telling the truth about his conduct; and no man of honor, whether French, English or Scotch, could have felt indignation on account of it. One of the duties of the press of the country is to criticize bad actions and denounce those who depart from right paths. The Conservative press, in comparatively moderate language, performed this duty; and to say that French electors voted for Dr. Douglass because the Opposition press criticised and condemned Pineau is to say that they not only sympathize with a political traitor but that they condemn newspaper criticism. The Guardian ought to apologize for the insulted honour and intelligence of the French-Canadian people.

NO LEADER.

COMMENTING upon the late session, the Montreal Gazette says:
"The accomplished work of the session amounts to very little, which might not in itself be a matter of reproach if what was done had been done with something like business dispatch. The lack of a directing mind, which has been visible from the session of 1897, was painfully evident however. Ministers did not seem to know what their colleagues were doing, nor to care. What was done one day would be contradicted the next by some action of the Government members. Argument would be contradicted by action, and one action by another. The insertion

of a "no precedent" proviso in the order sending the first contingent of troops to South Africa, followed by the sending of another contingent, was a precedent that the Government followed time after time. It presented the appearance of a rudderless ship in a sea of many currents."

These words of the Gazette convey a truth which has impressed all observing Canadians who take an interest in the politics of this country. The leadership of Sir Wilfrid Laurier amounts to nothing.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Sir Wilfrid's friends in Quebec must be in a panic; for his Quebec organ is telling the French Canadians that all Tories are Orangemen, and that all Orangemen are bound by oath to drive the French-Canadians out of Canada!

—The Montreal Star declares that the man who can produce a longer session than the recent one of the Dominion Parliament with a slimmer record in the way of business done should be awarded the reversion of the Cobden medal when the Premier gets through with it.

—Dr Wood, the collector of customs at St. John's, Que., has been condemned by both Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Toronto Globe. Sir Wilfrid has declared his conduct "offensive and reprehensible" and such "as could not be tolerated." The Globe finds that he has been guilty of serious misconduct and "has fairly laid himself open to very severe censure." Such being the case, it is worth while to recall of what Dr Wood has been guilty. It appears that some weeks ago a French Canadian girl named Potvin, who resides in St. John, remarked in Dr. Wood's presence, that he "hoped every Canadian who had gone to South Africa to fight against the Boers would be shot;" to which Dr. Wood replied: "The British in 1837 hung a number of such people as you, and should have hung more." Whereupon Potvin took the quarrel into the French newspapers, and a number of the more fanatical sheets, headed by Tarte's paper, demanded the immediate dismissal of Dr. Wood, for daring to speak in that way of rebels past and present. Subsequently the matter was brought up in the House of Commons by Messrs. Monet and Bourassa, and Sir Wilfrid, in the course of the debate, expressed the judgment quoted.

Russia's Campaign.

BERLIN, July 20.—The Berliner Tageblatt's correspondent at St. Petersburg declares that it cannot be doubted that Russia is preparing for a separate campaign against Peking, via the north, by land. He adds that Russia does not believe the allied campaign from Tien Tsin will be successful or in time. In reply to questions put to the Associated Press correspondent today, a leading Foreign Office official said:—"There has been no agreement between the powers regarding the size of the force to be sent to China. Each power is sending the number that she can spare. There has been no exchange of notes on the subject, but a tacit understanding seems to prevail that each power will send a contingent adequately corresponding with her real interest in China, commercial or territorial."

Fighting Smallpox.

MONTREAL, July 20.—Five new cases of smallpox developed today. All were among people who had been quarantined. The health authorities are making a great fight, and no doubt are able to keep the disease from becoming epidemic.
