DREDGING AT MONTAGUE—This week the third tow boat, Glen Livet, Saint John, N.B., Captain George Chapman, joined the Pugsware and Canoe at Montague where Dredge 115 is dredging out the Montague River. The long haul of several miles and the speed of the dredge in digging out silt, made it necessary to add a third tow boat. The dredge fills six scows a day, totalling 1600 yards, and in the short time it has been here has moved 9700 yards. A total of approximately 300,000 yards are required to be moved from the full three courses, each requiring four to five cuts. The channel depth has been lowered to 15 feet which will provide sufficient water for all boats coming to Montague during the shipping season this fall. It is expected, in an effort to complete as much as possible this year, that the Dredge 9 will also join the 115 in the near future, and will begin on another course. Ranges and tide marks were installed this week, and to all accounts the work is proceeding rapidly and well.
