GLACE BAY, N. S., Feb. 25 — Glace Bay Miners, with playing coach Norman (Bud) Poile again one of the sparkplugs, defeated Halifax St. Mary's 3-2 in a close-checking Maritime Major Hockey League game here tonight.

For Saints who took an early lead in the opening period and then frittered it away, it was a last opportunity to move out of their second-place tie with the idle Charlottetown Islanders.

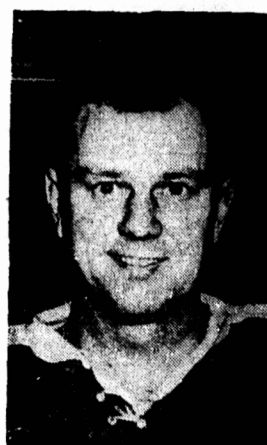

Vitale Back With Islanders Tonight

Big Phil Vitale, one of the most controversial players ever to wear a Charlottetown uniform goes back into action tonight at the Forum after a week's enforced layoff, imposed by the League Head Judge Elliot Hudson.

Those who know the durable defenceman intimately have the greatest respect for him not only as a player but as a man of fine steady character, good family man.

Those who know him only as the storm centre of many a hockey snarl, and little else about him are outspokenly critical of his tendency to roughness. Fact of the matter is, that Big Phil has a protective feeling for some of the less rugged Islanders and it burns him up to see some of them getting bumped around. Back at his defence position he watches every clash in which his own forwards are involved and when one of them is being hammered he gets

set for retaliation. That's the reason he sometimes goes out of his way to shake an opponent up, not for what the player may have done to Big Phil, but what he has done to a team-mate.

Twenty-five per cent of the Big Boy's troubles can be laid to this personal interest he takes in the well-fare of the rest of the team. This is especially true when the team is playing out of town.

On the Mainland where the Islanders take plenty of tossing around and fan heckling, Phil is a special and steady target for constant tormenting abuse. More often than not the opposing clubs deliberately goad him into infractions of the rules which result in penalties.

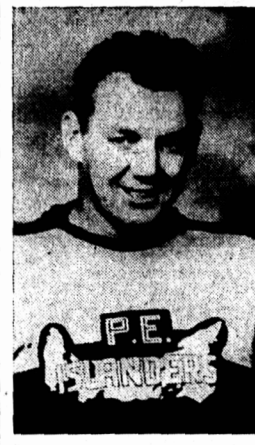
But withal Vitale is one of the leagues big drawing cards, and no member of the Islanders has more will to win, or tries harder than this hard-hitting defenceman. His team loyalty is inspiring.

Those who meet him off the ice at such places as the Curling Club, or about town, enjoy his easy-going complacency, and his commonsense comment on hockey. For instance, he seldom criticizes the referees even after a run-in with them. In fact he usually speaks well of the league officials.

As a player his effectiveness on the Island defence is unquestioned, and he is one of the neatest and most timely passers in the league. He can lay down a pass so well timed that the receiver can take it while in full career, without losing a particle of speed.

The big chap blows off steam sometimes but it is true to say that those who know him best like him best.

Hal Newhouser At Crossroads

LAKELAND, Fla., Feb. 25 — (AP) — Hal Newhouser, one of the great modern day pitchers, is at the crossroads of his brilliant career. In the next few weeks the baseball future of the 30-year-old Detroit southpaw will be settled. At the moment, he's optimistic.

"I'm going to find out real quick," he said at the Tigers training camp. "If I can't do it, I'll fold up shop and go back home. There's no use kidding yourself. I don't want to get paid for not working."

"I don't want to be a dog, winning five or six games with a bum arm and then going on relief. If I can't pitch I'll quit."

An arm injury—never more clearly diagnosed than a pulled tendon—sidelined Newhouser last season. He wound up with a 6-6 record and didn't throw a ball after July 14.

QSHL Play-Offs Start March 4

MONTREAL, Feb. 25 — (CP) — The Quebec Senior Hockey League will open its 1951-52 playoffs March 4 at Montreal and Chicoutimi. It was decided at a special meeting of team representatives here tonight.

Basing the selection of dates for the round on the supposition that Quebec finishes first, Montreal Royals second, Chicoutimi third, Ottawa, fourth, Valleyfield fifth and Sherbrooke sixth, the playoffs will start two days after the close of the 60-game schedule.

The league-leading Quebec Aces will meet Ottawa Senators in a best-of-nine, semi-final series, which will start in Quebec March 5. First Outbreak In Canadian History

OTTAWA, Feb. 25 — (CP) — Federal agricultural officials said today that the current outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease in South Saskatchewan is the first recorded in Canadian history.

"We know of no previous outbreak," J. G. Taggart, deputy minister of agriculture, told a press conference.

Maritimes Will Suffer Little

FREDERICTON, Feb. 25 — (CP) — J. K. King, deputy minister of agriculture for New Brunswick, said today that the Maritime Provinces would suffer little, if any, from closing of the United States border to Canadian livestock and meat exports because of the foot-and-mouth disease in Saskatchewan.

He agreed, however, that the producers elsewhere in Canada might suffer heavily through depressed prices in trying to dispose of meat on the Canadian market alone.

Mr. King said it was difficult to set forth immediately all the implications of the situation.

Will Recommend Return To Work

SYDNEY, N.S., Feb. 25 — (CP) — The vice-president of striking rural and village teachers in Cape Breton County said today he will recommend a return to work at a mass meeting tomorrow.

Cameron Sears, vice-president of the Nova Scotia Teachers' Union Local, said he will ask the county's 243 striking teachers to return to their desks on conditions formulated at a meeting today between the local's executive, municipal officials and Education Minister Henry Hicks.
