As well as scoring his 17th goal of the season, a season high record for him, he almost decapitated Bruin defenseman Bob Dillabough and goalie Ed Johnston in the same check. Both the Bruin players went for a loose puck at the same time and Shack, not hesitating a split second nailed them both. Dillabough left the ice with blood streaming from a cut on his head that required 20 stitches to close and Johnston suffered a severe case of bruised ribs. Shack skated off without signs of distress.

Local Track Not Only One; 40 Horses Die At Bowie

BOWIE, Md. (AP) — Fire leveled five barns at hard-luck Bowie Race Course Monday, killing at least 40 race horses, injuring others and setting off a stampede that reached a shopping centre four miles away. Officials said the bodies of 40 horses were found and that the number of dead animals might reach 60. The damage to horses and buildings was estimated at \$500,000. The blaze, fanned by high winds, came on the heels of Maryland's worst snowstorm in years. Temperatures were near zero, and snowdrifts were 3 1/2 feet high on parts of the track. Firemen used hand shovels to clear a path to the stable area, then fought the blaze for two hours before getting it under control. About 100 horses were freed from burning buildings by groomers and exercise boys. Some galloped down Route 301 to the Bel Air shopping centre four miles away. Others thrashed about in nearby woods and snowdrifts. MAY DESTROY SOME Track officials said some of the horses that escaped probably were injured so badly they would have to be destroyed. No persons were reported injured. The fire was the 15th—and most costly — since Bowie opened in 1914. The last fire was in January, 1964, at a private barn owned by a farmer near the track. Twelve horses died then. A track spokesman said each horse was insured for a maximum of \$5,000 under a blanket policy. He said it will be at least Wednesday before Bowie reopens. The cause of the fire was not determined. Bowie, one of three major race tracks in Maryland, is about 35 miles south of Baltimore, not far from Washington, D.C.

Bobsled Trials Are Postponed

CORTINA D'AMPEZZO, Italy (AP) — The opening training runs for the four-man world bobsledding championship were cancelled Monday because an exceptionally high temperature damaged the ice chute here. An international jury inspected the 1,740-metre Olympic course and declared it unfit for training runs. "There are large ponds of water in the bottom of the track and near several curves," said a spokesman. "If we let bobsleds go down, they would damage the track beyond repair before the weekend world event." The spokesman said no decision was taken on when the training would start. According to international rules, the bobsleds from 10 countries entered in the world races to be held Saturday and Sunday were allotted four days of training before the competition. The jury expressed hopes to be able to recover the missed training on Friday, the day in which the track should have been closed. On that day, the chute should have been checked closely for possible repairs before the start of the two-day races. Monday's temperature was 30.2. The jury is also scheduled Friday to draw the starting order of the four descents of the competition. Countries competing in the four-man event are the United States, Austria, West Germany, Italy, Romania, Canada, Czechoslovakia, Switzerland, Britain and France. VANCOUVER (CP) — Lynn Patrick coach of Los Angeles Blades, was quoted as saying defenceman Howie Young has been benched for a vicious stick attack on Vancouver Canucks' Bob McCusker. McCusker suffered a 10-stitch gash in his face when struck by Young's stick in a Western Hockey League game in Los Angeles Saturday. "I thought it was vicious," Patrick told a reporter from the Vancouver Sun. "It was ridiculous—there was absolutely no need for it." Referee Lloyd Gilmour informed the Los Angeles bench "that if out as much as went near any Vancouver player he would get a penalty" after the second-period incident, Patrick said. Patrick benched Young for the remainder of the game and left him in Los Angeles when the Blades started a three-game road trip Sunday. "Young has personal problems and they were in evidence before this incident and before this game," Patrick said. Gilmour admitted later he did not see Young strike McCusker while the two were battling for the puck behind a net. "When I saw McCusker's face I got as mad as I've ever been," the referee said. Gilmour said he would make a report of the incident to Western Hockey League president Al Leader.

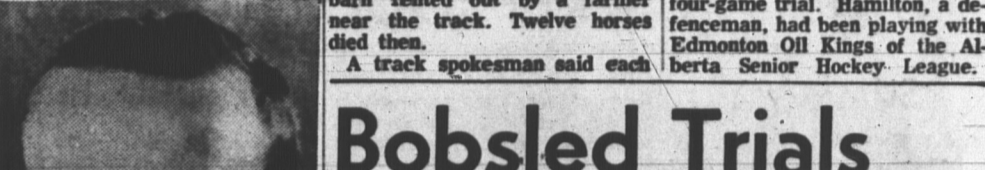
