PRINCE OF WALES COLLEGE.

Annual Mid-summer Examination - Reports of Examiners - The Prize List.

At the closing oral examination, held to-day, there were present, among other visitors, the Chief Justice, Mr. Justice Hensley, Rev'ds Isaac Murray, D. Fitzgerald, John McLeod and Stephen Lawson; Hons. W. W. Sullivan, Donald Ferguson, Neil McLeod and A. A. McDonald; Donald Montgomery, Esq., M. P. P.; Robert Shaw, Esq., M. P. P.; Mr. Manning, Superintendent of Education; H. Lawson, Editor of the Patriot; J. Caven, Editor of the Herald; P. R. Bowers, Editor of the New Era; Dr. Gordon, Dr. Dawson, Richard Sloggett, D. Currie, Thos. May, John Lepage, John Ings, Wm. Weeks, Henry Cundall and Lemuel Miller. Among the ladies who graced the occasion with their presence were Mrs. Hensley, Mrs. W. Weeks, Mrs. Anderson, Miss Ings and Miss Miller.

Mr. Alexander gave the students a little wholesome exercise in the play of MacBeth; and under the direction of Professor Anderson they showed their readiness and proficiency in mathematics. Mr. Simpson Lathern read part of an ornate essay on "John Milton." Mr. O. Rattenbury discoursed in a very good, original and vigorous style upon the virtues and peculiarities of John Bunyan. Mr. Fredk. Ings read a short, terse sketch of the life of Julius Caesar. Mr. Crabbe also essayed to read a concise account of the life of great Caesar. Specimens of other essays were read; and then

said that 57 students had been admitted during the year, that the average attendance since Easter was 40; that the students of Prince of Wales College who went abroad distinguished themselves this year as heretofore; that he was very sorry that Mr. Alexander—whose ability and culture as a teacher, and whose courtesy as a gentleman, he highly praised—was about to leave the Island; that the College was about to be amalgamated with the Normal School; that the training of teachers would be sedulously attended to by a training master, and that he should do his utmost to make the College work as expansive and efficient as it has ever been; and lastly—and most important of all—that young ladies would, in future, be admitted to all the advantages afforded by the institution.

MR. CAVEN'S REPORT.

Mr. Caven briefly addressed the students, and read the following report:— CHARLOTTETOWN, June 19, 1879.

To the Trustees of Prince of Wales College: GENTLEMEN,—In accordance with your instructions I set examination papers for the students of this Institution, in Greek and Latin, and in English Literature. There were in Greek four text books: Euripides, the Odyssey, Xenophon and the New Testament; in Latin, Livy, Virgil and Caesar. I also set papers for Composition, both in Greek and Latin, to the different classes.

English Literature embraced the play of Macbeth, a portion of the Second Book of Paradise Lost, and the Third Canto of the Lady of the Lake, and also the History of English Literature from the accession of Elizabeth to the Restoration. The classes in Latin I found not only conversant with the construction and idioms of the passages selected for translation, but also familiar with the narrative of their authors within the limits prescribed for examination. I concluded from this that no matter what passages were given for translation and analysis, the results would have been equally satisfactory with those obtained.

A good deal of credit is due to the junior Caesar class. The passage which fell to their lot was, perhaps, as difficult as one could be found in the Commentaries—yet the difficulties were surmounted with very great ease.

In Greek the same method of examination was followed as in Latin, with equally satisfactory results.

It is of importance to observe that while the students show themselves well versed in the beauties and elegancies of the literature of the Ancients, they are also able to appreciate the best writers in their own tongue. The papers I received on Shakespeare, Milton and Scott amply proved this to me.

In conclusion, I have to express myself satisfied with the work which the young gen-

tlemen did for me. Their papers bore the marks of careful teaching and diligent application.

MR. ROBERT SHAW'S REPORT.

Mr. Shaw said he had examined the students in mathematics, etc.; and that the result was sufficient to show that there had been careful training and good discipline. In his opinion Prince of Wales College deserves well of the Province, and he advised the Leader of the Government to take good care of it.

MR. MONTGOMERY'S REPORT.

To the Trustees and Governors of Prince of Wales College.

GENTLEMEN,—According to instructions I set papers for six classes, three in French and three in Roman History. No particular limit was prescribed for the first class in French. I was asked to select a passage for translation from any author, and to give questions on the grammar and construction of the passage selected. I gave a moderately difficult passage for translation from Montesquieu and a number of exercises calculated to test their knowledge of the French grammar. For the second class in French I set papers in Hall's Second Course and Brachet's Grammar. The third were confined to Hall's First Course and Grammar.

The Roman History papers covered the period between the time of Marius and the battle of Actium, including the antiquities, social and political organizations, and customs and manners of the Roman people.

The French papers were remarkably well done, as will be seen by the large percentage of marks obtained by the students. The answers given in Roman History were, in most cases, very full and accurate. A very important and remarkable feature connected with the examination is, that when the pupils fell short of the full value, it was rarely owing to inaccuracies. In almost every instance in which full marks were not obtained, they either left the question unanswered entirely, or answered such portions of them as they could clearly and intelligently set down.

Another feature worthy of notice is, that the questions requiring a lengthy reply were answered in such a way as to indicate a very thorough knowledge of English Composition. The narration of events was entirely free from the language of the text books I am satisfied not only with their knowledge of the facts of history, but also their mode of expressing the knowledge they have acquired.

The same classification has been adopted as in preceding years. Those above seventy-five

per cent., 1st class; those above fifty and under seventy-five, 2nd class; those above twenty-five and under fifty 3rd class.
