ST. JOSEPH'S CHURCH OPENING.

An ideal morn ushered in the Feast of
the Immaculate Conception, 1898, conse-
quently the pastor and people of Kelly's
Cross were jubilant, for on that day their
new church was to be dedicated for divine
worship by His Lordship Bishop McDonald.
Assisting the Bishop were Revs. Drs.
Doyle and Curran, R. B. J. A., and J.
J. McDonald, and A. P. McLeilan. A
Pontifical High Mass was sung by Bishop
McDonald, and the first-named clergy were
the officers of the Mass, while Rev. A. P.
McLeilan was master of ceremonies.
After the first Gospel an eloquent and
earnest sermon was preached by Rev. Dr.
Monaghan. It was a source of joy and
just pride to the people of St. Joseph's,
(and especially to his parents) to hear
such grand and eulogistic words from one
who but a few brief years ago was an
unassuming but ideal boy playing almost
within sound of his voice on the occasion
of the dedication of their new church.

During the services a collection was
taken up for the benefit of the church
funds, and, considering everything, was
very generous. The committee hereby
express their thanks to those who made
such splendid donations on the 8th,
especially Rev. Dr. Doyle and Messrs Michael
Duffy and James Kelly, Charlottetown.
In the evening at 5 o'clock the Stations
of the Cross were erected by His Lordship
and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament
given. The congregation likewise had
the very great pleasure of hearing a beau-
tiful sermon by Rev. Dr. Doyle, their old
time pastor of over twenty years ago. He
first gave a brief description of the origin
and spoke of the efficaciousness of the
devotion of the Stations of the Cross, after
which he referred, in feeling terms, to
old St. Joseph's where he so often per-
formed the beautiful ceremonies of the church
for many whose bones are now decaying
in the old churchyard, and for some of
those who now, again, are inspired by his
words to be, as the Rev. Dr. said and wish-
ed, "as much in advance of twenty years
ago, in virtue, as the new St. Joseph's is
in advance of the old. His sermon made
a deep impression.

The choir, under the leadership of Mr.
J. H. Monaghan, though few in point of
numbers, excelled themselves on this oc-
casion.

It is useless to attempt a description of
the interior of this beautiful edifice,—a more
artistic pen than the writer's is necessary
for the undertaking. The material was
supplied by Messrs Schurman, Lefargue,
Clarke & Co. Summerside, the workman-
ship is that of Creamer Bros., Kelly's
Cross, while the painting is artistically
executed by Mr. William Mullins, Char-
lottetown. The old altar, renovated under
the skillful touch of Mr. John Kelly,
Kelly's Cross, produced a fine effect.

The description of St. Joseph's Church
and the key to the successful termination
of the work may be briefly summarized
in a few words.—Rev. D. B. Reid is the
zealous, wide-awake, and indefatigable
pastor. Long may he be left to minister
to the people of St. Joseph's to enjoy the
fruits of his three years' ministrations at
Kelly's Cross.

pupils in attendance in 1898 was 106,
against 192 in 1897. There are five boys
and one girl from Prince Edward Island.
The building fund subscriptions have
reached \$22,619.16, of which \$20,795.03

raised, the debt can be cleared off. A small
