We have received No. 10 of the New England Catholic *Herold*, which has commenced publication in Lawrence, Mass. It is a neatly printed eight page paper, very newsy, and is edited by Mr. Henry O'Meara, a native of Charlottetown.

MEASURES—We are requested by a dealer to ask whether or not the wine measure can now be used in this Province? There are many dealers who are still using this measure, and are under the impression that it is lawful to do so, as long as the purchaser is aware that he is buying by that denomination of measure. Some light on the subject is necessary.

At 3 o'clock, this afternoon, a son of Mr. Robert Sneeston, while playing in the store on the north side of Queen Square, carelessly threw a lighted match into a box containing gunpowder. An explosion followed, blowing out one of the front windows, and somewhat disarranging the interior of the store. Mr. James Fisher—a journeyman with Mr. Sneeston—received slight injuries about the face. An alarm of fire was verbally given, but it was found unnecessary to sound "Big Donald."

REV. H. FOSHAY, Pastor of the Baptist Church of this city, has accepted a call to the Church at Sussex. To-morrow night he will preach his final sermon to his congregation in this city, and will immediately enter upon his new charge. Sussex is one of the prettiest towns of New Brunswick, and has a good Church edifice and a large and wealthy congregation. Mr. Foshay carries with him the esteem and best wishes of his congregation. The *Christian Visitor*, of St. John, welcomes him to that Province. According to arrangements entered into a year ago, Rev. D. G. MacDonald resumes the pastorate of the Church here.

BRADLAUGH'S CASE—An exciting debate on the Bradlaugh case took place in the British House of Commons on the 21st inst. It was participated in by Wolf, Fowler, Gladstone, Northcote and Labouchere. The latter took the side of his colleague, Bradlaugh, and in an impassioned speech appealed to the House to admit him to take the oath. He said Bradlaugh was elected for political and not theological purposes. If the question were referred to a committee, and that committee should report adversely to Mr. Bradlaugh's claim, Mr. Labouchere said he would bring in a bill to enable Mr. Bradlaugh to make affirmation. On the 26th the case came again before the House. An amusing debate took place, and the House, on motion of Richard Power, adjourned over Derby day.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

MONTREAL, May 27.

Last night a young man named Gallagher was arrested here for stealing letters from the Post Office. For some time past letters have been missing from the office, and a fellow clerk on searching Gallagher's pockets for tobacco, found several of them.

To-day, Corpus Christi day, is a provincial holiday, and is being strictly observed by the Catholics of this city.

To-day the Vice Regal party are visiting shops and manufacturing establishments. They visited Gilbert's foundry this forenoon. They will leave for Ottawa in morning, whence Prince Leopold will go to Chicago. **NEW YORK, May 27.**

A Sacramento despatch says this afternoon the Supreme Court rendered a decision in the Kearney case, releasing him. The hearing was on an *habeas corpus*, appealed from the Superior Court of San Francisco.

LONDON, May 27.

In the Commons to-day, Sir Charles Dilke said the Government was well aware of the injury to trade caused by the war between Chile and Peru, and was desirous of offering friendly services in the matter; that such friendly overtures had hitherto been ineffectual; that the Government had been and are in communication with other Governments on the subject, and that if a favorable opportunity for mediation should offer, they would avail themselves of it. He also said the British Minister at Madrid had several times protested against the claims of Spain to the Northern part of Borneo.

A deputation of the Aborigines' Protection Society, including many members of Parliament and Froude the historian, waited upon Lord Kimberley to-day, to urge the recall of Sir Bartle Frere from South Africa, in consequence of his conduct in reference to the Zulu war. Kimberley referred the deputation to the statement relative to Sir Bartle Frere made by Gladstone in the Commons. He declared that the annexation of the Transvaal was irrevocable, and said he could not send a commission to South Africa to inquire into the alleged grievances of the natives, as such a course would cause great confusion and be useless.

In the House of Lords to-night, Earl Granville stated that arrangements for the first step of the Powers to press upon the Post the performance of its obligations were so nearly concluded that he hoped to shortly lay the papers before the House. Until then, he said, it was inconvenient to give further information.

GENERAL NEWS.

There were ten sunstrokes in New York and Brooklyn on Wednesday.

Reports from Santa Fe of the 24th are that Gen. Hatch's command surprised Victoria's band, killing 30 Indians. The Indians fled in disorder. Reports from Socorro County are that all the ranches have been abandoned and over seventy herders were killed by the Indians.

The "Daily Telegraph" says: We have received from an authoritative source a document containing a resume of the Albanian difficulty, embodying, as we have reason to believe the views of the German Government respecting the most desirable solution. The document states a feasible solution to be the sanction of the autonomy of Albania under a native prince doing homage to the Sultan as Suzerain. The Porte does not regard this unfavorably, and the British Cabinet might rejoice in the conviction that it had assisted another Balkan people to achieve emancipation.

It appears that on the 20th of April Bismarck sent a confidential despatch to the German ambassador at Vienna, remarking on the retrogression of negotiations with the Vatican, and intimating that it was due to the easily overwrought expectations of the Catholic prelates, through their faulty acquaintance with the real state of affairs. The Prussian Government only intended to disarm, not destroy the weapons they could command by legislation. Bismarck declares he never uttered a syllable which could be interpreted as indicating a willingness on the part of the Government to abolish the May laws, in conformity with the demands of the clericals. The peaceful practice of an endurable *modus vivendi*, the basis of mutual tolerance, was the most that ever could be obtained.

According to unofficial but trustworthy advices, an unfettered offer of the Amership was made to Abdul Rahman Khan by the British mission. Abdul Rahman wishes to consult the chiefs before deciding.

There are disturbances in Upper Burmah, close to the frontier. On Monday three men, disguised as Monks, with 26 followers, crossed the frontier and burned a village, after a fight. The Governor was killed and the insurgents were triumphant. There are rumors of a great pitched battle, in which the insurgents were victorious. The Burmese Embassy remains.

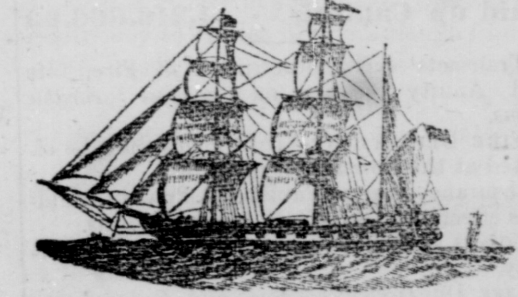
