QUICK WORK.—The schr Mary E, of Cardigan began loading at Murray River, on Monday the 29th, ult., and finished the same day with a general assorted cargo, consisting of lumber, cattle, sheep, fowl, butter, hay and about 500 bushels of new potatoes, thus indicating the enterprise, push and energy of the farmers and shipper, Wm Lamont, Esq., who is running a successful and prosperous mercantile branch at Murray River in connection with his store at Eldon. The Mary E sailed from Murray River on Tuesday morning at 7, and at 3 o'clock Wednesday evening she was lying peacefully at anchor in the placid waters of St. Pierre, making the expeditious voyage from the anticipated "railway terminus" at Murray River to her port of destination, St. Pierre, in the short and unprecedented space of 32 hours, or in other words 56 hours from the time she began loading, until she was safely anchored in Miquelon. Skipper Mark Bonnell was at the wheel, and knowing that he had a good and substantial schooner, able and competent crew, genial and level-headed supercargo (A. A. McDonald) besides being endowed with more than ordinary nautical ability, with push, pluck and perseverance as his motive, punched her from port to port like a bullet.—Com.

This was kept up with great enthusiasm till about midnight when our gallant ship returned and landed all safely on Knight's wharf, where three rousing cheers were given for the success of the "Ark Light," and the generosity of the owner, Mr. Kickham. The Birthplace of Josephine.

Fort de France, Martinique, is the strongest fortified point the French own in America. It is both a military and naval station, and a fort was erected on a mountain top there years ago, which has since been improved and strengthened by some of the most modern guns known in warfare.

During the civil war the United States cruiser Kearsarge chased the Confederate blockade runner Alabama into the harbor, and was on the point of opening fire on her when the authorities forbade it. Here they remained for some time, and during a stormy night the Alabama slipped out and disappeared in the Caribbean sea.

Several times the place has been badly damaged by tropical cyclones, during which hundreds lost their lives. It is noted as being the birthplace of the Empress Josephine; a life size piece of statuary of her adorns the principal plaza. The fort has had for years but one family—the king of Dahomey and his six wives, whom the French captured after great trouble in the African wilds and imprisoned.—Philadelphia Record.
