

Conference in Safety Scheduled For S'side

A one-day safety conference of the Workmen's Compensation Board of P.E.I. will be held in Summerside, Wednesday, Nov. 27. It will be held at the Canadian Legion Home and will be for Prince County employers and workers.

Board secretary, M.E. Campbell, said the reason for the Summerside conference is "we feel there are many top management superintendents and foremen whom we have not reached in this area, with the two conferences we have already held in Charlottetown."

Mr. Campbell said the meeting will be a "work conference" where questions about workmen's compensation, protection equipment and many other problems will be covered.

During the day, a demonstration on fighting industrial fires will be put on in Summerside by the fire fighting service of the RCAF Summerside, in co-operation with local police and fire authorities.

Special speakers will be A.L. Pieroway, safety director of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission, as guest speaker at the banquet which will conclude the conference.

Other speakers being arranged for are W.B. Power and Louis Keyhoe, safety officials of HMC Docksyard, Halifax, and Canadian National Railways safety instructor Frank Bellevue, Montreal.

Among the exhibitors of industrial safety equipment will be Safety Supply Company, Halifax; Mine Safety Appliance Co., Sydney; and Palmer and MacLellan Limited, Fredericton.

Private Sessions Feature Council Meeting In S'side

The regular meeting of the town council was held last night in what must be considered a near record time of 45 minutes. Only routine matters were brought before the meeting.

A clause relating to representatives of the Wilnot area was held before the regular meeting however, and a second, private "get-together" was held following the meeting.

A similar "caucus" meeting was arranged in connection with the erection of the centennial memorial fountain. A committee meeting will be held tonight to discuss possible projects under the winter work program.

The town manager's report stated a winter works program for clearing out the young growth on the town-owned Bowers ranch property, to be ultimately used for town purposes, has been approved. Anthony Arsenault will supervise crews necessary for the operation, likely to employ 50 men.

Coun. George Key, Jr., said that the cost of winter works was close to 70 per cent over its budget for the first 10 months of the year. "Serious consideration should be given this matter".

Wage, Working Hours Suggested By Board

A conciliation board, appointed by the department of welfare and labour, has recommended a 20 per cent wage increase and a 30 per cent increase in working hours for employees of the town of Summerside and Local 204, Canadian Union of Public Employees.

The report of the board is now on its way to Welfare and Labour Minister Henry Wedge, the union local and the town. It is believed that the report will be accepted by all parties concerned.

The report recommends that the union and the town accept the wage and working conditions approved by the board.

The board report recommends a normal work week of eight hours a day, Monday to Friday, with time and a half over time, nine statutory holidays with double pay when employees are required to work on these days.

The working agreement is to be effective from Jan. 1, 1964 to April 30, 1965, with a pay increase of five cents an hour, effective Jan. 1, 1964 and a further increase of five cents an hour, effective May 1, 1964.

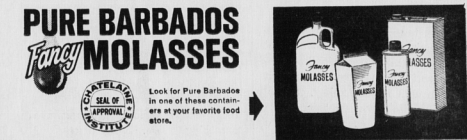
