Political Considerations Seen in Debate Above

By KEN KELLY - Sources in government and opposition ranks see powerful political considerations in the government's decision to press on with the Commons flag debate to a conclusion.

On the government side, informants say that perhaps the strongest political factor is a belief that the flag decision must be made as early as possible before a federal election. They consider that an election within a year or 18 months of a parliamentary flag battle would pit French Canada against the English-speaking majority. Basis for this view is that

strongest support for the maple leaf flag is from Quebec and that the greatest opposition to it is from Ontario. The theory is partly borne out by opinion polls.

Opposition sources see another factor in the dominant factor. They speculate that support in English Canada for the Red Ensign is strong enough to isolate the Liberals into a Quebec-based party if translated into election votes.

Alta. May Drop Student Loan Plan

EDMONTON (CP) - Education Minister R. H. McKinson said Friday Alberta may not participate in the federal government's new student loan plan.

"From what we understand, the federal loans will be at a higher rate of interest - about 5 1/2 per cent - compared with 3 1/2 per cent for the Queen Elizabeth Fund (a provincially-operated student loan scheme)." Mr. McKinson said the cabinet expects to make a policy statement next week.

They figure the appeal of the maple leaf flag, if translated into election votes, would produce a majority of Liberal seats in the Commons but aggravate dissunity in the country. They base their forecast of a Liberal majority on a belief that the appeal of a deciding factor in election voting, it has overwhelming appeal to French Canadians, almost as strong appeal to voters with neither French nor English links and some support among those of British stock.

These three groups are divided in roughly equal proportions of the voting population.

However, Conservatives judge the flag appeal, as a deciding factor in election voting, it comes close to giving them one-third of the votes in most of the ridings outside Quebec.

But they discount the idea that outside Quebec the result would be as the Liberals see it. They argue that most of the votes will be three - cornered battles in which anything over one-third of the votes cast will be enough to win the seat.

The Conservatives, reinforced by some opinion polls, calculate that Red Ensign support, if translated into election votes, comes close to giving them one-third of the votes in most of the ridings outside Quebec.
