Polio Vaccine Supply Is Assured, Department Told

Connaught Laboratories, Toronto, yesterday informed Dr. Burton Howatt, Provincial Health Officer, they could foresee no reason for any delays of delivery of Salk vaccine to the Province and the supplies already requested by the Health Department will be available.

From the above health officials feel confident that the program of immunization planned for this year will be carried out as scheduled. Yesterday saw the completion of a fairly satisfactory two day polio immunization clinic, which was conducted by the Health Department at the Charlottetown Baptist Church Hall. During the period 1,228 pre-school age children and 88 expectant mothers received their first injections.

"Although the response was reasonably good it did not quite come to expectations" said Dr. Howatt, "original estimate of the department had been in the vicinity of 2,000". Probable reasons for a number of non-attenders could be attributed to the inclement weather of Tuesday and a certain amount of indifference on the part of some parents.

Monaco Rushed Preparing For Arrival Of Grace Kelly

MONTE CARLO (AP) — Monaco's princess-to-be due to arrive within a few hours—was as busy Wednesday as a city preparing for a siege.

Both flags and rumors flew, wedding gifts piled up in the palace and squads of workmen and servants rushed to get everything ready for Grace Kelly's festive entry into the principality today.

For a week thereafter, Monagueses and the horde of visitors will be involved in an almost continuous round of gaiety. Monaco is certain to belie the name given it by the ancient Phoenicians—"place of rest." Nobody in Monaco is going to relax until a week from today, when Prince Rainier III and Grace, doubly married in civil and religious ceremonies, will sail away on his yacht for a three-week honeymoon.

The prince himself is busy with official conferences and last-minute meetings that have tired him until, friends say, it shows both in his face and manner.

Today the liner Constitution is to anchor a few hundred yards off Monaco. If the weather is good—and it has been for several days—the prince's yacht, gleaming white with new paint, will slide up to the side of the big ship and take Grace and her family ashore.

Aboard the Constitution Miss Kelly told reporters Wednesday that while she is anxious to get ashore, she wants to keep one foot figuratively planted on American soil. She said she hopes to keep her registration in New York and to vote in the next election.

The whole Riviera clearly is going to be seething for the next week. There isn't an empty hotel room. Among Wednesday's arrivals was a bridesmaid, actress Rita Gam.

Western Newsmen Arrives For Post In Red China Capital

David Chipp, who has been Reuters correspondent in Karachi, Rangoon and other Far Eastern centres, has arrived in Peking to become resident correspondent. He is the only Western agency correspondent permanently based in the Chinese Communist capital. His first dispatch follows.

PEIPING, China (Reuters) — Chinese Press, China (Reuters) — Wednesday led mourners at the burial ceremony of the ashes of 11 victims of the sabotaged Indian Airlines Constellation Kashmir Princess—one year after the airliner in which they were passengers crashed into the sea north of Indonesia.

Eleven passengers — three Chinese officials, five Chinese, one Austrian, one Polish and one Vietnamese journalist—were on their way to the Asian-African conference in Bandung, Indonesia. Five of the Indian crew were also killed.

The ashes of the bodies, which were recovered from the sea, were buried in one casket covered in yellow silk at the base of a 15-foot-high memorial column of grey marble in the tree-lined cemetery

The biggest gift, a Rolls-Royce presented by the Monaco council, is en route through France in the care of two chauffeurs. The crested, black and grey car is drawing big crowds wherever it stops.

Jewelry is flowing in at a rate to make any bride's eyes sparkle. When Miss Kelly arrives she will find \$200,000 worth of ornaments already on hand or in the offing.

Pictures of the dead flanked the column which contained the names of the victims and the inscription "grave of martyrs who died while going to Asian-African conference."

ONE MINUTE SILENCE
Representatives of the Indian, Polish, Indonesian and North Vietnamese missions were among 1,200 mourners who filed past the column.

The burial, under a stone bearing a carved peace dove, was followed by one minute of silence and a funeral oration by the vice-chairman of the All-China Journalists Association, Wulen Hsi. He said the dead were victims of "international murder."

Referring to the sabotaging of the plane The People's Daily in an editorial says the British authorities had the responsibility of clearing up the case as it took place in Hong Kong. The authorities should not stop with current investigations but should take effective measures to convict and punish the criminal.

"This is a responsibility which the British government and the British authorities in Hong Kong cannot evade."

Neutralist Will Take Office Today As Premier Of Ceylon

COLOMBO, Ceylon (Reuters)—Solomon Banaranneke, Oxford-educated "neutralist" whose People's United Front party won a landslide victory in Ceylon's general elections, will be sworn in today as the new prime minister.

Sir John Kotelawala, whose United National party lost 46 of 84 seats, resigned Wednesday as prime minister and minister of defence and foreign affairs.

His resignation ended nine years of rule by the United National party. Results of the three-stage election which ended Tuesday reduced the party's standing to fourth. Of 12 ministers who sought re-election, only two were returned. Of the 95 seats contested, the

Record World Oil Production

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—The United Nations says that world oil production last year made a record increase to a record level. It said the increase in the Communist sphere was higher proportionately than anywhere else.

Its monthly bulletin of statistics for April reported that the world's output of crude petroleum and natural gasoline rose 1 1/2 per cent to more than 788,000,000 metric tons.

The bulletin, published by the UN statistical office, showed that the highest rise for any region was 17.2 per cent for the Soviet Union, eastern Europe and mainland China.

Other minerals were 16.8 per cent for the Middle East (including Egypt), 13.4 for western Europe, 12.4 for the Caribbean (including Colombia and Venezuela) and 8.2 for North America.

Rev. A.D. MacLeod Widely Mourned

Rev. Alexander D. MacLeod, retired United Church minister, and widely-known many years for his voluntary hospital visiting work in all hospitals in the Saint John and Lancaster areas, died recently in Saint John General Hospital at the age of 93. He had been ill for about three years.

Born in Valleyfield, P. E. I., February 26, 1863, he was a son of the late Alexander and Margaret (Matheson) MacLeod. His parents were members of a group from the Scottish Highlands, who settled in the Valleyfield area.

Graduated from Mount Allison University in 1892. Mr. MacLeod was ordained in Moncton in 1893 in the Methodist Church. He had spent some time as a student minister at Grand Manan, Alma and Moncton.

Among the pastorate he served were Hunter River, Mount Stewart and O'Leary in P.E.I., and Oak Hill, Oak Bay (Charlotte County), Harcourt (Kent), Gibson Memorial Church, Fredericton and Nashwaaksis, Carmarthen Street United Church, from which he retired in 1933, was Mr. MacLeod's last pastorate. Since then he had devoted most of his time to hospital visiting, offering a cheerful word and friendship to patients of all denominations, from the Tuberculosis Hospital, East Saint John, to the DVA and Provincial institutions of Lancaster.

The Maritime Conference of the United Church, meeting at Sackville in 1953, honored Mr. MacLeod with a testimonial to his long service in the church, marking his sixtieth year since ordination, with an illuminated scroll. Since retirement he had held membership in

Portland United Church. In 1954, Mr. and Mrs. MacLeod celebrated their sixtieth wedding anniversary. Mrs. MacLeod, formerly Laura H. Roberts, Murray Harbor, P. E. I., survives him. Also surviving are two daughters, Miss Edith L. M. MacLeod, at home, and Mrs. W. Frank Townsend, Gadsby, Alta.; two sons, G. A. Lorne MacLeod, Hampton, N. B., and Carman S. MacLeod, Edmonton, Alta.; three grandchildren three great-grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

The funeral took place with service in Portland United Church Interment was in Cedar Hill Cemetery.

Outlook For Maple Sugar Crop Better

SHERBROOKE, Que. (CP)—Outlook for the 1956 maple sugar crop has improved substantially in the Eastern Townships during the last few days, farmers reported Wednesday.

The coming of ideal sugaring weather at long last is held responsible. Cold weather earlier blighted hopes and sap runs.

The total run is not expected to reach last year's district mark, which was not nowhere close to record. But fears of almost total failure have vanished.

Prices are dropping as supplies increase and a few bush owners even look to bettering their 1955 output.

It is believed about half the crop is in. Sap boiling has been under way since last Saturday. Last Friday, harvesters were asking as much as \$10 a gallon for syrup but prices have slipped down to about \$7.

Producers in Brome, Compton, Shefford and Richmond counties now predict fairly good seasons. Provincial government agricultural officials had predicted last Saturday that Quebec, which provides about 90 per cent of Canada's maple sugar output, seemed headed for a crop one-fifth as big as usual.
