### Zhukov Not To Get Invitation

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Eisenhower administration has decided against inviting Soviet Marshal Georgi Zhukov to visit the United States, officials said Saturday.

President Eisenhower, in off-the-cuff remarks at his press conference Wednesday, said an exchange of visits between Zhukov and Defence Secretary Wilson might be helpful.

But, officials said, he never meant to imply that there was any actual plan to invite Zhukov to Washington. They expressed surprise at the wide ripples of excitement stirred by Eisenhower's words.

In the House of Representatives Friday, some Republican members called Zhukov the "butcher of Budapest" and warned against inviting him.

### Driest Summer Causes Damage

BOSTON (AP) — Seared crops, dwindling water supplies and an increasing threat of disastrous woods fires plagued Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut Sunday as one of the driest summers in recent years, reached the midway point.

Not since April 12 has there been substantial rain in the three southern New England states. Only occasional, and then very light, showers have fallen which have done little to ease the situation.

Massachusetts forestry director

Raymond J. Kenney said "we're just riding on the ragged edge" as far as the woods fire hazard is concerned. He said a "good wind" would mean serious trouble since most woodlands are heated almost to the point of spontaneous combustion.

Farmers in the rainless area estimate their losses thus far in the millions. Most corn is stunted or wilted and other crops have been completely lost to the drought.

### Sunday Hottest Day Of The Year

NEW YORK (AP) — Sunday was the hottest day of the summer along the Atlantic coast from New York city into Virginia.

It was 103 in Baltimore by mid-afternoon, only one degree below the record high for the date, and 100 at Wilmington, Del., and Gordonsville, Va.

New York's 97.3-degree reading was the hottest of the year and sent thousands from the metropolitan area to beaches and outlying areas.

Thunderstorms boiled up in the heat and were expected to drop temperatures somewhat. Cooler air invaded parts of New England. Heat and humidity made most

### Drive For More Collective Farms

BERLIN (Reuters)—East Germany is launching a drive for more collective farms as the five-year-old collectivization process shows signs of levelling off.

The East German ministry of agriculture announced in June that there were 6,268 collective farms in the country on April 1. This shows that a few have gone out of business since the end of last year, when there were 6,281, though the area of land being collectively cultivated increased during the first quarter of 1957 by 3,850,000 acres from 3,580,000 acres.

About 24 per cent of the cultivated land in East Germany now is collectively farmed.

To encourage collective farms to increase the acreage under cultivation, the East German government ruled recently that only half of the crops from newly-titled land in future will be subject to state deliveries—the system under which a proportion of the farm's produce is compulsorily sold at a comparatively low rate to the government.

### Writes Screen Play For Windsor

NEW YORK (AP) — Cleveland Amory, the author who broke with the Duchess of Windsor over the writing of her memoirs, has been signed to write the screenplay for a television film on the life of the Duke of Windsor.

"I'm going to try to do an objective job," Amory said Saturday.

The duke's life story will be shown next winter on the new Columbia Broadcasting System film show, The Twentieth Century.

Amory, in confirming he had signed to write the script, said it will be based on the duke's autobiography and other documentary sources. Asked if he would consult with the duke personally, he said, "I don't expect to."

In October, 1955, Amory returned from Europe saying he had been engaged to work with the duchess on the preparation of her autobiography, but had failed to see eye to eye with her.

"You can't make the Duchess of Windsor into Rebecca of Sunnybrook Farm," he told reporters then. "The facts of life are stubborn things."  
Rebecca is the happy heroine of a young girls' fiction classic.

### Old Dynasty Is Topping

TUNIS (Reuters)—A dynasty 250 years old tottered on the verge of collapse Sunday night as Tunisia prepared to declare herself a republic.

The political bureau of Tunisia's ruling Neo-Destour party meeting today is expected to abolish the monarchy and declare the country a republic.

Habib Bourguiba, prime minister since France gave Tunisia independence two years ago, will preside at the meeting and is universally regarded as the natural

choice to be the country's first president.

The party weekly newspaper Action said in a weekend editorial that the dynasty of the pro-French 75-year-old Bey of Tunis, the present monarch, is "a dead tree that is going to uproot."

The Bey's authority has been at low ebb in the face of Bourguiba's tremendous popularity. The crisis came to a head Saturday with the arrest of the Bey's youngest son, Prince Salaheddin, charged with trying to run down a police inspector with his car.

The Bey belongs to the Husseinite dynasty which has occupied the throne in Tunis since 1705.
