Denies Charges Re Income Tax

OTTAWA, March 13 (CP)—Revenue Minister McCann said today he wished to "deny flatly charges of political interference" with the collection of income tax from different groups in Canada.

Speaking in the Throne-Speech debate Dr. McCann said that Hazen Argue (COP—Assiniboia) charged the Revenue Department with "playing politics" in connecting income tax from farmers.

"The accusation is entirely without foundation," Dr. McCann said. Mr. Argue had attempted to use average figures to show that more income tax was collected from western farmers than from farmers in the east, particularly in Quebec.

Farms in Western Canada were 1-2 to three times as large as those in Ontario and Quebec, said

Dr. McCann. Another factor was the size of the families in Quebec. He could give assurances that the same conscientious effort is made to collect taxes from farmers in the east as from farmers in the west.

Strange But True

The Quakers or Society of Friends, are curious Christians in that they are without creed, liturgy, priesthood or sacrament. A committee of Quakers purchase Nantucket Island in 1840 for thirty pounds and a couple of beaver hats.

Ever hear of the "Chicken-Cock Church"? The name is applied to a tiny Lutheran place of worship in Halifax—seating capacity fifty—because atop its pinnacle rests a business looking chanticleer, symbolizing constant watchfulness against the wiles of the devil.

In the Vaudriol Collection in Chateau de Ramezay, Montreal, may be seen a church bell that has a curious yet interesting history. This musical casting is known to antiquaries as the Saint John Bell. It is engraved with the maker's name together with a cross and fleur de lis.

Paris records show this bell was one of three donated by Louis XV of France. "Le Bien-aime" and was blessed at Louisburg, 1735, and christened Saint John.

For a time, after it was taken from Louisburg it hung in the steeple of the Lutheran Church at Halifax, but ultimately was transferred to St. John Anglican Church and finally sold for \$100.00.

Talented Island Artist At Work On Historic Painting

The following news item about a talented Prince Edward Islander appeared recently in Brattleboro, Vermont's daily newspaper, The Brattleboro Reformer:

"Hubert R. Rogers, local artist, left Sunday for Ottawa, Canada, to complete the painting of the historic meeting between Prime Minister Winston Churchill and President Franklin D. Roosevelt at Quebec City in 1943, a project which is being carried out under a commission from the Canadian Government for the National Gallery of Canada. Mr. Rogers was requested to be in Ottawa this week in order to take advantage of Winston Churchill's present visit in the Canadian capital where he will be available to the artist for the final sketches.

Mr. Rogers conceived the idea for the painting at the Quebec meeting in 1943 which he witnessed as a representative of the Canadian Wartime Information Bureau. He gathered background information at that time and did some of the necessary sketches, including one of Mr. Churchill's daughter which he is presenting to the Prime Minister this week.

"He started the project in 1944 when the Canadian National Gallery showed some interest in the idea, and has been working at it in his spare time ever since. It has necessitated a number of sittings of individuals, military and civilian, who took part in the historic event. These, Mr. Rogers explained, have taken considerable time and travel on his own—because for the first few years on the project all he had to go on from the Canadian Government was its expression of "interest." But now he has the Government's formal acceptance and its commission to complete the painting—a task to which he will devote all his time for the next five weeks in a studio prepared for him at the National Gallery in Ottawa.

"Since 1949 Mr. Rogers has conducted art classes for the Brattleboro Adult Education Program. These are being postponed until his return from Canada."

Mr. Rogers as I Knew Him

Mr. Hubert Rogers was born and brought up in Alberton, Prince Edward Island, and is very proud of the fact. He's often said that Islanders are the most wonderful people in the world, which all Islanders know is the truth. He became interested in painting during the First World War while hospitalized in England. As he told it, the man in the next bed was an artist and during the long hours he would talk endlessly of his art. So fascinated was Mr. Rogers by the talk of his hospital companion, that immediately upon reaching the United States he enrolled at a famous art school in New York City. This whimsical beginning had a very successful development, for Mr. Rogers proved to have an exceptional talent with the pencil, pen, and brush. He has studied under two world-famous artists, and since that time has been constantly enlarging and developing his scope to its present proportions.

Mr. Rogers is married, and has two russet-haired children who often pose for his illustrations—in exchange for a modelling fee, of course. Mr. Rogers, a former professional dancer, teaches an Adult Education class the art of Modern Dance, which is a form of bare-footed ballet popularized by Gloria Graham during the last quarter-century. The writer attended a class once, and believe me, there's nothing like it!

Together with the project now at hand, his regular job as illustrator for science fiction magazines, and his weekly Art Classes at the Brattleboro Community Center, Mr. Rogers keeps himself in constant motion. But he is never too busy to make a visiting Canadian—especially an Islander—feel like a Mayflower in the middle of December. Here is an artist who is making a name for himself. Here is an Islander of whom we can all be proud.
